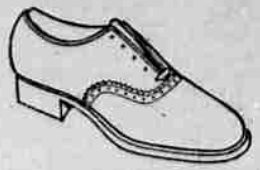

PRIVATE FLYERS TO MEET IN EUGENE

EUGENE, April 14—(AP)—Plans for an air meet to be held here early in June by the Private Flyers association, group of amateur aviators in Oregon, began to take on definite form today as Yale Smith, president, announced the department of commerce had granted a waiver for the meet.

It is the first time such action has been taken in this country by the department, officials of the association said. The department of commerce has frowned upon amateur competitive meets in the past.

The association has been requested by the department to make a survey of all amateur-built light planes for use in the formation of new regulations which will enable issuance of suitable licenses to amateurs, President Smith revealed.

Plans for the air meet, which is expected to bring at least 50 private planes here from several states, will be completed in the near future.
