LIQUOR BODY TURNS DOWN AEBI'S PLAN

PORTLAND, April 14 — (AP) — The state liquor control commission refused to consider a proposal today that it undertake to license all employees of retail beer establishments as a guard against improper conditions.

The suggestion was advanced by the Oregon Food and Beverage dispensers through its president, Ernest H. Aebi.

The commission told Aebi that the proposal was one for the legislature to consider rather than the board, whereupon Aebi asked the commission for its aid in writing an amendment into the Knox law at the 1937 session.

Aebi contended that licensing of employees was necessary to regulate the sale of beer and protect the beer parlor owner against illegal acts of an employee. An employee guilty of an improper act could thereafter be barred from employment elsewhere, Aebi asserted.

The commission ordered the purchase of a 500-gallon tank for its bottling department to increase plant capacity to 2,500 gallons. Besides bottling its own liquor, the commissions is doing some bottling for Montana, Idaho and Utah commissions, charging them a service fee.

Applications for agencies or stores in Jacksonville, Spray, Rufus, Ashland, Unity and Reno were denied, the commission saying that stores in nearby towns provided sufficient service.

Licenses were also denied applicants in Mount Angel, Timber, Garibaldi, Bly and Portland.
