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WENDEL HELD TO
FACE NEW CHARGE

TRENTON, N. J., April 16.—(AP)—Exonerated of the kidnapping murder of baby Charles A. Lindbergh in Mercer county, Paul H. Wendel, disbarred lawyer, today remained in jail here pending action on a kidnapping warrant in Hunterdon county, sworn out at Flemington by Mrs. Anna Hauptmann, widow of the executed slayer of the infant.

The Mercer county jury voted "no bill" without dissent last night. The Hunterdon county grand jury has not yet considered Mrs. Hauptmann's charge that Wendel kidnapped the Lindbergh baby, resulting from a confession Wendel later repudiated.

Prosecutor Anthony M. Hauck, Jr., of Hunterdon county, will present this case to the jury "if and when an investigation indicates the matter should be presented for action."

Embezzlement charges against Wendel in Mercer county also are pending. It was thought likely these would be held in abeyance that Wendel might go to Brooklyn to assist in an investigation into his story of being kidnapped and held prisoner in February.

Wendel claims he was held captive there and forced to sign the confession he later repudiated and on which he was exonerated last night.

Presenting legislation he and Senator Hayden (D., Ariz.) introduced recently, Cartwright said congressional action would determine whether the national road program for the next three years would be progressive or "an uncertain, hand-to-mouth policy," pursued by the various state highway departments.

The legislation, designed to continue and expand the existing Hayden-Cartwright road statute, would carry authorization for expenditures of these amounts for 1935 and for 1936: primary roads, \$125,000,000; secondary roads, \$25,000,000; road through public lands, \$2,500,000; forest highways, \$10,000,000; grade crossing elimination, \$50,000,000.

"Immediate enactment of this bill is necessary to avert the major calamity that would result from new demoralization of the highway industry," he declared. "Of primary importance, of course, is the fact that highways are being improved so as to provide avenues of travel for motor vehicles but the employment phase also is of great importance."

Importance Stressed
The highway program for the next fiscal year is not directly involved in this bill but the sound, economical planning of road building is a long-range task. Construction programs for 1937 will be affected by action on this bill because this action will tell the states whether they can operate under a stabilized, three-year program or whether they must lay out their construction schedules on a one-year basis.

Cartwright explained the bill, which has been approved by his committee, would authorize appropriations of \$25,000,000 for both 1938 and 1939 for "secondary or feeder roads," the sums to be matched by states.

"This is the first time such a proposal has been incorporated in a federal-aid bill," Cartwright declared.

"The bill also provides for continuation of grade crossing elimination," he said.

Illinois Vote Eyed
Democratic leaders in the capital were particularly interested in final Illinois figures which showed that President Roosevelt, unopposed for re-nomination, received 1,158,856 votes, with about 6,000 of the state's 7,426 precincts reported. This compared with a combined total of 696,263 for Knox and Borah in 6,006 precincts.

Another political development was the action of the Georgia state democratic executive committee, controlled by Governor Eugene Talbot, foe of the new deal, in setting the long-debated question of holding a statewide primary.

The committee voted to hold the primary June 3 with an entrance fee of \$10,000 for presidential candidates. Marion Allen, state manager for Mr. Roosevelt, had demanded a primary.

ures, automobile regulations, advertising, utilities, liquor proposals to abolition of compulsory military training in the state's institutions of higher learning.

Amendments Proposed
The constitutional amendments proposed are:
The homestead tax exemption provision up to a \$2,000 assessed

valuation.
An amendment prohibiting the enactment of a law which forbids truthful advertising. This is directed at the recent statute regulating advertising of dentists.
An amendment providing for the compulsory recall of all officials. This would provide that recalls against public officials be on the ballot every two years, making all terms equivalent to two years only.

The state grange proposal for a temporary hydroelectric administrative board until a new power board can be elected. This would be a constitutional amendment.

The amendment providing for a flat 10 per cent tax on all real property up to an assessed valuation of \$2,500.

Providing for the return of "home rule" for liquor regulation by cities, a constitutional amendment which was repealed early in the prohibition era.

An amendment providing that no law be passed which would make a sales tax possible.

The amendment to the constitution providing for the non-political appointment of the game and forestry commissions.

11 Get Ballot Titles

The eleven measures for which ballot titles have been issued are:
An old age pension and disability bill sponsored by Byron Johnson of Portland. It was believed the circulation of these have been dropped.

An act forbidding dealers of motor fuel to handle both wholesale and retail business.

Opening the lower part of the Rogue river to commercial fishing during certain seasons.

The state grange power bill, similar to the one previously defeated and which would set up an electric power commission.

The state bank proposal, sponsored by the grange.

Three commercial fish proposals affecting the Columbia river; one would prohibit use of set gear, while two, almost identical, would regulate the size of drift gillnets.

The chain store tax bill.
Repeat of the Knox liquor law under which the state liquor control commission is now operating.

Abolishing compulsory military training in Oregon's higher institutions of learning, making it unnecessary to receive credits in military work to obtain a college degree.
