CLEVELAND EVENS UP WITH DETROIT

Bridges Blasted Off Mound in 14-7 Game; Cardinals Down Cubs, 7 to 6.

The plague of injuries which was one big reason why the Cleveland Indians did not figure in last year's American league pennant race, seems to have been left behind with the close of the 1935 campaign.

Grave doubts as to the condition of Bruce Campbell, the outfielder who was laid low in mid season by spinal meningitis, and Pytlak, the tribe's only reliable catcher who suffered a breakdown in 1935, followed Cleveland into training camp this spring. Two regular season games, however, indicate there is little cause for worry from these sources. Between them Campbell and Pytlak made seven of the tribe's 17 hits yesterday as they blasted the world champion Tigers 14 to 7. Campbell clouted four, including a home run.

Off to a bad start when Detroit belted Hadlin for four runs in the third, the tribe fell on the world series hero, Tommy Bridges, in the same inning when Tronky hit a homer with two aboard and scored eight runs.

Fist Fight at N. Y.
The heavy hitting which marked the opening games Tuesday continued right down the line with only 22-year old Harry Gumbert of the Giants turning in an outstanding mound performance. Gumbert limited the Dodgers to four hits, including a boundary belt by Eckhardt to win a furious contest 5 to 3. The high spot of the game came in the second inning when Bartell tripped over Mungo's foot as they raced for first and jumped up to toss a few punches. Both teammates discouraged their "fraternizing."

The Boston Bees, abandoning the humble role for which they had been cast, did the day's second best job of hitting when they pounded Philadelphia pitching for 16 blows and scored the series with a 12-4 triumph. The Phils made only one less hit but couldn't come close to matching the nine-run outburst with which the Bees drove Bowman to the showers in the fourth.

Yanks Again Beaten
The Yankees belted three Washington pitchers for an even dozen "at-bats" but went down for the second time, 6 to 5, when the Senators laid into Pearson and Murphy for four hits, which were joined with an error and two passes for four runs in the seventh inning. The White Sox outlived the Browns to win the other American league game 6 to 3 as Stratton hurled effectively in the clinches and aided his own cause by hitting a double and knocking in two runs.

The Red Sox and Athletics put the season's first postponement on the records when it rained at Boston.

Cardinals Beat Cubs
The combination of two ex-giants, Manager Frank Frisch and Roy Parmelee, proved too much for the Cubs and the Cardinals turned back the National league champions 3 to 2. Parmelee, acquired from New York last winter, gave only seven blows in a duel with Leo and Frisch's homer with Moore aboard in the fifth won the game. The Pirates downed the Reds, 7 to 6, scoring their winning run in the ninth on hits by Jensen and Paul Waner on Goodman's error.

CARSON'S BAT AIDS PORTLAND TO WIN

Portland's Beavers landed on three Los Angeles hurlers yesterday for 14 hits and a 9-5 win. Carson was none too steady for Portland but he hammered out a home run and a double, a mighty good day at bat for any pitcher. Schulmerich, Angel right fielder, also boned. The victory moved Portland into fifth place, over San Diego.

Sidney Stringfellow, the Coast league's No. 1 booster of baseballs, sat on the bench yesterday and many strange things happened. Sacramento won a ball game, 5-1, from the San Francisco Missions. An unfamiliar 9 was marked down in the Senator error column. Frank

Morehouse, who moved into Stringfellow's berth at short, played sparkling ball, figuring in the game's two double plays. Lyons' left handed twirling deserves some credit. He allowed eight scattered hits.

Not so strange was the resulting Seattle-Mission exchange of second and third places in the standings.

A brilliant triple play helped boost Seattle's Indians into a 4-2 win over the San Francisco Seals. Hunt nabbed Gira's fly in right field, whipped it to Shortstop Wright who doubled Baruch at second and threw to first to catch Monzo. Gregory weakened only in the second when the Seals got three of their six hits and both their runs.

The day's best mound performance was turned in by Olds, who hurled his first full game of the season for Oakland and shut out San Diego's Padres 2-0. He allowed only six singles and never more than one an inning.

KIDNAP PLOT AIMED AT ROYALTY FAILS

BRUSSELS, April 16.—(AP)—A threat to kidnap the motherless children of King Leopold of the Belgians was disclosed today with the arrest at Liege, eastern Belgium, of a 31-year-old former convict, Nicholas Elen.

Police of the city of Liege said the arrested man confessed to writing letters to the king, threatening to abduct the royal children, whose mother, Queen Astrid, was killed in an automobile accident, unless money was left in woods near the border city.

Police said Elen signed his letters "gangster" and demanded 2,000,000 francs—about \$132,000.

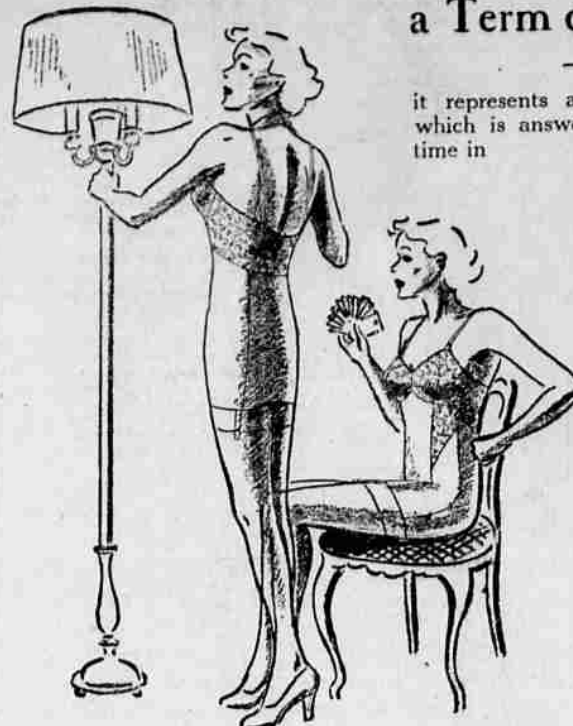

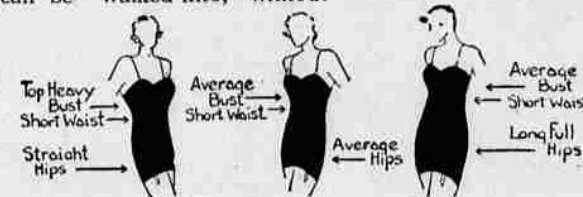
