OPERETTA WILL BE ENJOYABLE ENTERTAINMENT AT SENIOR HIGH TONIGHT

Tonight, April 17, at eight o'clock the Benson school annual operetta, "Polly Make-Believe," will be a very enjoyable entertainment to be presented at the senior high auditorium and to which the general public has been most cordially invited.

The story of "Polly Make-Believe" is as follows:

Polly and her little invalid friend, Jimmy, orphans in an asylum, overhear the madman saying that Jimmy is to be sent to a home for incurables. Polly, not liking the thought of their being separated, steals away with Jimmy one day. After walking many miles along a dusty road, they come upon a deserted cottage belonging to a big estate. In its yard is a beautiful apple tree in full bloom. Its branches, softly waving in the wind, seem to say to them, "Come in, Polly and Jimmy! Come in!" They pause, and as they rest beneath its friendly shade, agree that they will make this lovely spot their home. They name it "Polly's Make-Believe Orphanage," and print the sign on a board, fastening it to the tree. Lasse and Mack, also orphans, are attracted by it, and join Polly's family. Other young people from the town nearby become their friends, and Lill, one of them, tells Polly that as she came along, she saw a man with a kind, sad face watching them through the trees. She thinks it must be Mr. Watson, who has just returned to live in his house near them, the cottage in which Polly is established being part of his estate. Polly, alarmed, realizes that they have no right there, but Lill reassures her by telling her what a good man Mr. Watson is known to be, devoting his time and means to helping others, especially children. Buttons, a small colored boy, brings a message that they are all to appear at Mr. Watson's house the following morning. Polly is again alarmed, but is calmed as she hears the

apple blossom fairies singing in the breeze, and she makes up her mind that there is nothing to fear.

Act II. When Polly visits Mr. Watson, she learns, to her surprise, that he reminds him very much of a sister he lost years before, and he proposes to adopt her. She gladly agrees, on condition that he will also care for her orphan friends. She is sent to boarding school. Jimmy is placed in a special hospital; the cottage is repaired; and everything is made new and attractive again.

Act two opens, one year later, when Polly returns. There is much happy excitement, as she arrives, her arms filled with gifts for all. She reveals the surprising news that she and Jimmy are brother and sister, Mr. Watson having discovered that they are the children of his sister who perished at sea. They were rescued and placed in an orphanage, and he could find no trace of them. Then, best news of all, Jimmy's lameness is completely cured, and Mr. Watson is to erect a real orphan's home in memory of his sister, on the very spot where Polly started her Make-Believe Orphanage, where children like Lasse, Jimmy and Mack will always be wonderfully cared for. Buttons becomes one of the happy group through a mysterious infiltration, although he is much frightened during the ceremony.

The happy story ends with Polly's final make-believe "melting pot," in which foreign children are mixed together and are made splendid Americans.

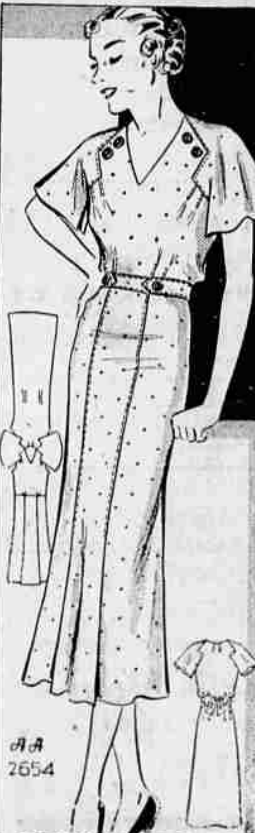
