Accomplishments of CCC Recounted

Douglas Crews Make Fine Records

Editor's Note—The month of April marks the third anniversary of the civilian conservation corps. During the three years the CCC camps have been maintained in the Roseburg area, much valuable work has been done in development and improvement work in Douglas county, according to V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest. The following is one of a series of articles summarizing the achievements of the CCC in the Roseburg area:

SOUTH UMPQUA FALLS CAMP

With the month of April, CCC activities go into their fourth year on the South Umpqua district of the Umpqua National forest. During the past three years accomplishments of inestimable value towards saving the forest for posterity have been carried out by CCC men under the guidance of local forest service men.

There have been young men from all sections of the United States; the middle west represented by boys from Nebraska and Illinois, and local Oregon men, all working to make the forest less subject to destruction by fire or element of nature.

One of the major projects has been building roads to make the administration of the district more efficient and provide quick access to the remote sections in case of fire. In the past three years seventy-four miles of new road have been constructed and road betterment has taken care of another eighteen miles. Three large log stringer bridges were built on this road system. A large item in connection with roads is keeping them maintained so that they can be traveled. There is now one hundred forty miles of road in the district that the CCC's maintain spring and fall.

An extensive telephone and trail

network is very necessary to connect all loose ends of the district to one central headquarters, the ranger station. Twenty-one miles of telephone line have been hung, and forty-four miles of trail have been built to bring this network to a high operating efficiency.

Visibility at lookout points is very important during fire season. Seven such points have been cleared and one new lookout house on Coyote point in the southeastern part of the district was built.

Stations Improved

Many station improvements that are the product of CCC labor are noticed throughout the district. A new four-room guard station with barn and water system was built at Devils flat. At Tiller a large five-room house capable of accommodating twelve men was constructed. Also at Tiller, a new ranger station is under construction consisting of an office, ranger's dwelling, and a dwelling for the protective assistant.

Camp ground improvement has been done at South Umpqua falls and Camp Comfort on the South Umpqua river for recreational use by the public. A complete forest camp was also made at Devils flat on Cow creek.

Miscellaneous jobs accomplished have been gopher eradication on 4000 acres of range land; construction of two miles of pasture fence; and mowing of several lookouts during the summer fire season.

Probably one of the most noteworthy, and certainly one of the major projects handled effectively by the CCC's and forest service supervisory personnel during the past three years, was fighting forest fires on the district. In that time over one hundred fires were reported and fought, yet the total burned area was less than fifty acres.
