NEW WATER FRONT WAR HITS COAST

Longshoremen Standing By Chiefs Whom Employers Brand "Radicals."

SAN FRANCISCO, April 17.—(AP)—San Francisco longshoremen solidly backed their leaders today, increasing tensions in the city's latest waterfront crisis. Faced with an employers' refusal to deal with the "radical, subversive and communistic" leadership, the International Longshoremen's association local in a closely guarded meeting late last night endorsed its officers who were elected by overwhelming majorities.

The longshoremen, estimated at from 1,500 to 4,000, unanimously expressed "complete faith" in their leaders and adhered "absolutely and unreservedly to our democratic and constitutional rights to elect officials of our own choice."

They agreed they would accept employment only through the joint hiring halls established in the arbitration award which ended the protracted and bloody coastwise strike of 1934. Earlier in the week employers decreed no more gangs would be taken from the hiring halls.

Employers on Monday broke off relations with the local charging repeated violations of the arbitration award in a move they declared was directed solely against radical I. L. A. leadership here.

Mr. Habbick's new position, broadly stated, will involve the building up of weak churches, conducting evangelistic services in churches desiring his services, supplying pulpits vacant by removal of pastors until said churches secure a regular pastor and other duties pertaining to such a general office.

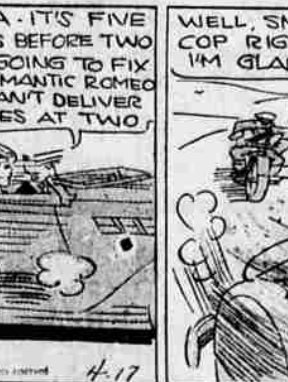
