Editorials on the Day's News

PLEASE note this dispatch: "Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin (of Great Britain) said today the only way to secure European peace is to be ready to fight for it, if necessary."

That is the kind of peace Europe has been getting during the nearly 20 centuries covered by written history, and it seems to be about the only kind she can have.

It has been a bloody kind of peace.

THIS is the bald truth: Europe will NEVER have peace as long as the only way to get it is to fight for it. The only lasting peace is that which is based upon ability to get along without fighting.

NOTE, also, this dispatch, which comes from Geneva: League of nations officials announced that a resolution deploring the continuance of the east African war and declaring existing sanctions against Italy will be maintained is to be introduced at the special session of the council Monday.

That is to say, the league of nations has been declaring sanctions (boycoits) against Italy but Italy's war against Ethiopia has been going on steadily and apparently successfully.

So sanctions don't seem to be

FORREST MCKAY'S TRIAL IS OPENED

The trial of Forrest McKay, local service station manager, on a charge of reckless driving, was conducted in the justice court here today before a jury composed of Leon McCintock, C. W. Stinner, C. W. Groves, Percy Croft, George Sewell and J. F. Dillard.

McKay, it is claimed, was driver of a car wrecked on Winchester street, Sunday, April 5, resulting in serious injury to Madeline Bruce of San Francisco and Royce Mailey of Sutherlin.

Officers claimed that McKay was driving in a reckless manner when his car swerved into a telephone pole. Evidence was introduced that he had been drinking, although a charge of drunkenness was not included in the formal complaint.

The defense claimed McKay was not driving at an excessive speed, but that he lost control of the car when forced to swerve sharply to avoid a car making a turn ahead of him.

It was expected the case would be delivered to the jury for a decision late this afternoon.

FLASHES OF OREGON EVENTS

PORTLAND, April 20 — (AP) — Major General Smedley D. Butler, now on a speaking tour, told interviewers here he favored an amendment to the constitution barring United States military forces from fighting outside the boundary of the nation. He said war was bound to come and "I think it will start in Asia, between Japan and Russia."

THE DALES, April 20 — A bullet from an accidentally discharged gun killed Dorothy Clark, 8, of Dufur, while she and two other children were playing at the D. West home. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Clark.

EUGENE, April 20 — A dispute over the price of some land, which led to the arrest of Charles Clements, a farmer, for alleged threats to shoot road construction crews, reached a peaceful settlement. The county agreed to build a fence for Clements and he, in turn, accepted the county's price of \$375 for right of way through his property. The sheriff drove him home.

Capture of Hoylman Reported Near

QUARRY LURKS IN JOSEPHINE COUNTY WILDS

Posses Concentrate Search in Patrick's Creek Area, Where Fugitive Was Declared Seen.

MEDFORD, April 20 — (AP) — A concentrated hunt for Raleigh Hoylman, fugitive adjudged habitual criminal, facing life imprisonment sentence, was under way today in the wilds of Josephine county, near the California-Oregon state line. Posses aggregating 100 men, led by the sheriffs of Jackson, Coos and Curry counties, with deputies from Del Norte county, California, were engaged in the chase. A dozen Oregon state troopers from southern Oregon are participating.

The sheriff's office here reported: "Hoylman's capture is reasonably certain."

Hoylman, according to the sheriff's office, has been positively identified as being in the district between Cave City and Patrick's creek. It was reported that the search had been narrowed down to a wild and wooded canyon in the Patrick's creek area.

Stolen Car Is Clue
The first definite clue that Hoylman was in that section came last Friday afternoon with the discovery of an automobile belonging to Roscoe Baden, Wilderville farmer. The Baden car was stolen last week.

The sheriff reported that Hoylman's fingerprints had been found on the steering wheel and the windshield. Another unverified report stated that the escapee had been seen riding a bicycle on the Redwood highway.

Hoylman, an experienced woodsman, is well acquainted with the country in which he is being sought. He escaped from the Jackson county jail on the night of Friday, April 10, by beating and slashing his jailer into submission with a pair of scissors and a bottle containing vinegar. He was scheduled to appear for a mandatory life imprisonment sentence the following morning.

Hoylman was adjudged a habitual criminal under the Oregon habitual criminal law, which provides life imprisonment for conviction of more than four felonies.

HELENA JARRED BY ANOTHER TREMBOR

HELENA, Mont., April 20 — (AP) — An earthquake described by weather bureau officials as the "sharpest in over a month" was felt in Helena for three seconds at 1:23 a. m. today.

W. E. Maughan, U. S. meteorologist, said the shock was of moderate intensity and brought the total felt here since last October 12 to 1,851. The weather bureau records show Helena has experienced an earth movement every day since last October 12.

Engineers estimated a two-year supply of irrigation water already is stored in the reservoir.

Louis M. Howe, Who Aided Roosevelt In Long Political Career, Passes On

WASHINGTON, April 20 — (AP) — President and Mrs. Roosevelt will journey from the white house tomorrow night to attend the burial of Louis McHenry Howe, friend and secretary, at his former home, Fall River, Mass., on Wednesday.

Funeral services for Howe, 65, who died in his sleep Saturday night at the naval hospital here, will be held in the white house tomorrow.

Leaders of the government and old friends will gather to honor the memory of the counselor who stood at elbow of Mr. Roosevelt throughout his rise from a New York state senatorship to the nation's highest office.

After the funeral services the body of the little, soft-spoken adviser, who was variously called "master mind," "kingmaker," "Warwick" and "mystery man," will be taken to Fall River, Mass., his "other home," for burial.

Howe's friendship with the man he affectionately called "the boss" began in Albany, when Mr. Roosevelt was a state senator and Howe a newspaper correspondent.

Through success, failure and near-tragedy, they were inseparable. Howe was with Mr. Roosevelt when the latter was assistant secretary of the navy in the Wilson administration; advised him in the unsuccessful drive for the vice presidency in 1920, encouraged him through the attack of infantile paralysis and was in the inner council during the 1932 campaign.

After the presidency race, word came that Howe was resigning. Mr. Roosevelt said Howe and James A. Farley were responsible, "above all others, for the great victory."

MAN AND WIFE DIE IN FLAMING PLANE

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., April 20 — (AP) — The second Allegheny mountain air tragedy in a fortnight marked up as victims today Frederick H. Harvey, Kansas City business executive, and his wife.

The 41-year-old vice president of the Harvey Railway Eating House system and Mrs. Elizabeth Harvey died yesterday in the flaming wreckage of their airplane on a rocky hilltop 15 miles from Johnstown.

Sixty miles to the southeast, near Uniontown, the big air transport Sun Raer fell in the mountains April 7 and took the lives of 10 passengers and two pilots.

Harvey, a veteran pilot and a director of transcontinental and western airlines, had flown east to meet Mrs. Harvey, returning from a visit in England.

While flying over the hills near the mining village of Dunlo, Harvey's recently purchased ship apparently hit a set of power lines near a mountain top and plunged to the earth.

Flames immediately engulfed the plane and a fire started in the underbrush around it.

The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey were burned beyond recognition. A pet dog also died with the couple.

Harvey was an army flier during the World war and was widely known throughout the midwest as an aviator and sportsman.

IOWA BANK HELD UP BY 4 BANDITS

SIoux CITY, Ia., April 20 — (AP) — Four bandits held up and robbed the Merchants State bank here today and kidnapped four bank officials and employees. One later released them a mile from the bank.

The amount of money taken by the bandits was not determined. As the bandits fled through the bank door one of them fired a shot at Don L. Nissen, assistant cashier, but the bullet went wild.

Mrs. Rose Hagley, a teller, ducked under the counter when the bandits displayed firearms and was left in the bank evidently unharmed by the bandits. She said she attempted to release the four gas tanks with which the bank is equipped, but the apparatus failed to work.

Howe did not flag through the slow years of recovery. He maneuvered Roosevelt's return to the political spotlight and was at his side through two triumphant terms as governor of New York. In those years, 1928-32, Howe held no title. He lived in the Roosevelt home in New York city and had a room in the executive mansion at Albany.

FEHL HEARING IS SET FOR SATURDAY

SALEM, April 20 — (AP) Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan today set Saturday as the time for hearing of arguments in habeas corpus proceedings filed to secure the release of Earl H. Fehl from the state penitentiary.

The petition was filed late Saturday by Fehl's wife, Elsie A. Fehl, in an attempt to secure the prisoner's release after he had refused a conditional parole offered by Governor Martin.

Fehl's attorneys contended that Oregon's statutes on parole have been so interpreted that his release was a matter of right. A recent opinion by the attorney general held that a prisoner, upon serving his minimum term with time off for good behavior, was entitled to release only through parole.

Fehl, former Jackson county judge sentenced to a four-year term for ballot theft, completed his minimum sentence of 32 months last Wednesday.

The parole, proffered by Governor Martin, stipulated that Fehl should not return to Jackson county.

HEROINE, 15, GETS BADGE OF HONOR

SALEM, April 20 — (AP) — The heroic work of Grace Ballenger, Portland girl, in saving the life of her sister from fire, brought her a badge of honor from the state fire marshal's office, it was announced here today.

The junior fire marshal heroine service badge will be presented the 15-year old girl at the Commerce high school Wednesday by Hugh H. Earle, state fire marshal.

Earle announced the deed was performed at the Ballard home in Portland last January. Fire from a stove ignited the dress of Dorothy, 17, while the two girls were home alone. Grace wrapped her sister in a blanket and held her on the floor until the fire was extinguished. Both girls suffered burns.

TWO TRAPPED IN MINE WEEK AGO STILL ALIVE; RESCUE WORK GOES ON

MOOSE RIVER, N. S., April 20 — (AP) — Dr. D. E. Robertson, one of two men still alive after a week's imprisonment in a gold mine, reported this morning he and his companion could hold out for at least 12 hours longer.

With Dr. Robertson, part-owner of the mine, was his time keeper, Charles Alfred Scadding, and the body of his partner, Herman R. Magill, Toronto lawyer, who succumbed during the night, apparently to hunger and exposure.

Veteran miners were digging from two directions to get at the trapped men.

P. D. Henderson, mine manager, predicted rescuers would get through the crumbling tunnels before noon. The miners were furrowing in through loose rocks without stopping to timber up their passages.

Registration Shows Increase Of 366 Voters

With a total registration of 12,787, Douglas county has gained 366 voters since the 1934 general election, according to a summary of registration for the 1936 May primaries as compiled by Roy Aage, county clerk.

Republicans registered for the May election total 7,712, a loss of 67 since November, 1934. Democrats, on the other hand, gained 429 to make a total of 4,719. Miscellaneous registrations, totalling 356, showed a gain of 4.

The registration for the primary election is considerably heavier than for the special election in January of this year, when there was a total of 11,841 voters, divided into 7,251 republicans, 4,247 democrats and 343 miscellaneous.

KANSAS CITY GETS TOWNSEND MEET

KANSAS CITY, April 20 — (AP) — Dr. Frank Dyer of Los Angeles, convention secretary for the Townsend old age pension clubs, announced today the organization will hold its national meeting here July 2 to 5.

Free use of Kansas City's new municipal auditorium for the last three days of the convention was granted following a conference today between Townsend representatives and City Manager H. F. McElroy.

WILMINGTON, Del., April 20 — Dr. Francis E. Townsend, originator of the Townsend old age pension plan, says one of the major aims of his organization is to end both the major political parties.

"Vote this administration out," he urged in an address here yesterday, "then vote the next administration out, until we get enough strength to put our plan into effect."

Dr. Townsend predicted the November elections would place his organization in control of the house of representatives.

SALEM, April 20 — W. O. Livingston of Vernonia and Ira B. Aldred of Silverton succeeded Theodore G. Nelson of Salem and W. E. Burke of Yamhill as members of the Townsend area board for the first congressional district, at a meeting here Saturday.

Nelson, candidate for the U. S. senate, and Burke, candidate for state treasurer, resigned from the board after receiving instructions from Townsend headquarters that officials of the organization should not be candidates for public office.

LOCAL BOY PASSES 1ST WEST POINT TEST

Keith Bannister, member of the graduating class of Roseburg senior high school and an applicant for admission to West Point military academy, has successfully passed the preliminary examinations, according to word received this morning by his father, Kenneth Bannister, manager of the local Montgomery Ward company store.

Following his graduation from high school this year, Keith plans to enter Braden's military school at Cornwall on the Hudson in July for one year's preparatory study. He will take civil service examinations late in the year, and will take the West Point entrance examination in January, 1937. If successful, he will enter West Point in the July class next year.

"Good. We are coming. We will be there."

The three men were trapped Easter Sunday night when an area of land 400 feet long, 75 feet wide collapsed and sank 15 feet.

Since then rescuers have met repeated disappointments in efforts to reach the 141-foot level of the Macmillan shaft where the men were trapped.

DEMAND PUT UP TO LEAGUE MEET, GENEVA

Verbal Duel Between Rival Envoys Results; Addis Ababa Deserted as Invaders Near.

(By the Associated Press)

The diplomatic feud between Great Britain and Italy broke out on the floor of the league of nations council at Geneva today shortly after Italy had made known that its price for peace in Ethiopia was virtually the whole of the east African nation.

Anthony Eden, Great Britain's foreign secretary, attacked Italy's alleged use of poison gas saying it "cannot be passed over in silence."

Baron Aloisio of Italy answered: "I would remind the representative of Great Britain that the Italians who have been victims of atrocities also have mothers and children."

The French delegate pleaded for the continuance of conciliation efforts "until they are crowned with success." The Russian delegate said the league was weakened by "the lack of certitude that all members... will act together against any aggressor."

Aloisio told the league council that if Duce's terms for an armistice were "occupation of all centers of mobilization including the capital itself, and frontier points through which arms may be delivered to Ethiopia."

After hearing the delegates of the belligerent nations, the council met in a private session and drew up a resolution deploring the failure of the two nations to negotiate for peace and called upon Italy, as one of the founders of the league, to bring to an end her conflict in east Africa.

NATIVES QUIT ADDIS ABABA AS ITALIAN ARMY NEARS (Copyright, 1936, by the Associated Press)

ADDIS ABABA, April 20 — Rumors that Italian troops were nearing Addis Ababa precipitated a rush of natives from Ethiopia's capital today, but most of the foreigners encamped in the big yards of the legations.

The city was virtually deserted, with only the government offices, the post office, the cinema house and the bank among the few establishments carrying on activities.

The bare-footed blue-uniformed
