SUTHERLIN MAY SECURE SAWMILL

SUTHERLIN, April 21.—If the negotiations work out that the Cole brothers, Washington, and S. Shatterson & Son of Los Angeles, California, a modern mill for the purpose of cutting oak timber may soon be in operation six miles west of Sutherlin.

H. J. Cole, a former well known resident of Coles Valley, west of Sutherlin, but for several years past a resident of Spokane, Washington, where he has business interests, was in Sutherlin two or three days, week, conferring with local people in regard to a sawmill industry which he hopes to see established here in the near future.

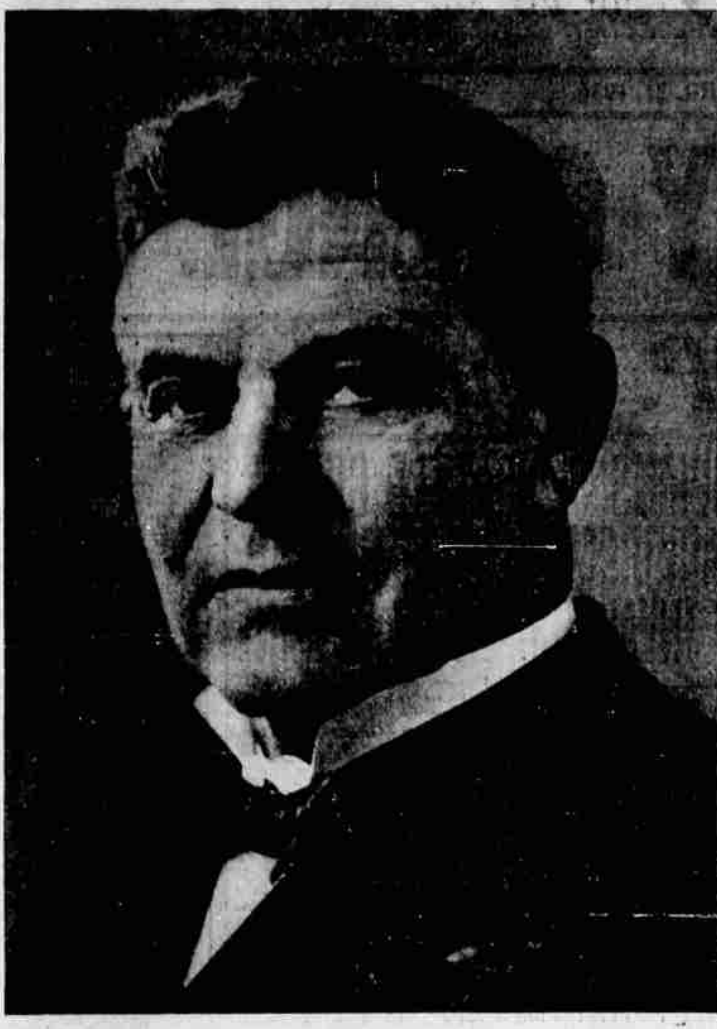
Mr. Cole is the owner of 300 acres of excellent oak timber five miles west of Sutherlin and is now negotiating with R. Patterson & Son of Los Angeles for its development. If the deal is closed, it is the intention of R. Patterson & Son to put in a mill on the property at once for the purpose of cutting the timber into flooring and other purposes for which oak is extensively used.

It is stated that good oak wood is becoming very scarce on the Pacific coast and that there are but a few places where a considerable acreage, such as Mr. Cole has, may be found. Mr. Cole stated there is a good demand for oak timber, especially flooring, and he believes that the proposed enterprise would be a success from the start. He mentioned that a mill such as the one he contemplates would be able to give employment to at least twenty-five people.

Memory of Former Roseburg Educator Honored at D. A. R.-Sponsored Program

The memory of the late Dr. J. B. Horner, prominent Oregon educator and historian, was honored at a program sponsored by the D. A. R. last evening at the Woman's club building in Roseburg, with a large attendance of friends and club members present. Mrs. Horner and Mrs. J. L. Gault, of Corvallis, both formerly of Roseburg, were present for the program. Mrs. F. H. Churchill, as chairman, introduced Dr. C. A. Edwards, who gave the interesting life of Dr. Horner.

Dr. Edwards opened his address by quoting Van Dyke's four things to guide the life of a man, which was lived by Dr. Horner: "Four things a man must learn to do, if he would make his record true—To think without confusion clearly, to love his fellowmen sincerely, to act from honest motives purely, to trust in God and heaven securely."

Dr. Edwards brought out the wonderful inheritance both physically and mentally, given to Dr. Horner by his parents. He moved with his parents from Virginia City, Nevada, in 1862 to Walla Walla, where a short time later his father died. He started his education under the tutelage of Mrs. Rev. John Plinn, who gave him his most cherished possession, a New Testament, which Dr. Horner always carried with him. He helped to

haul the lumber for the building of Whitman's seminary, was in the first class of the opening day of the college and in the first graduating class. He received his doctor's degree at Whitman.

He later came in contact with the late Dr. Louis Albert Banks, who advised him to go to Philomath college, near Corvallis. He was graduated there and became widely known and loved for his interest in singing. From Philomath, he went to Huntville to teach one year. He was married to Isabell Skipton, September 5, 1888. From Huntville, he went to Union, Ore., and then to Brownsville to teach two years, after which he entered Willamette university and was graduated there in 1884.

Dr. J. R. N. Bell, of Roseburg, went to Salem to obtain a new principal for the Roseburg schools and selected Dr. Horner to come to this city.

Dr. and Mrs. Horner moved to Roseburg, and their two daughters were born here, Miss Vera Della Horner, now head of the history department at Corvallis high school, and Mrs. Alice Pearl Horner Wells, teacher in Washington high school, Portland. Dr. Horner graded the schools in Roseburg and was principal here for six years, before going to Albany and within a short time thereafter went to Corvallis as head of the department of history at Oregon State

college, a position held by him for 42 years. While teaching at Oregon State, he began majoring in Oregon history and branched out to do historical and geological research work in Oregon. He wrote five editions of Oregon history.

In 1906 Dr. and Mrs. Horner made a trip abroad, visiting Rome, Greece, Egypt and Palestine. In 1911 Dr. and Mrs. Horner and their two daughters again visited European countries.

Established Museum He established the museum in Corvallis in 1923 and this institution is now estimated in value at half a million dollars. He was a member of Knights of Pythias, Knight Templar and Elks.

In closing, Dr. Edwards compared the life of Dr. Horner to that of Abraham Lincoln and gave the following quotation: "A man is wanted for the Lord—Life take Thy tools and make the man—How him and mold and form and shape an ancient line—Thou knowest the plan—Life do Thy work, but ere its close With tender skill the task pursue Smooth of the rough and rugged edges—And safely touch with evening dew What has Thou here—a simpleton, a babe, a block—Nay, such came He to Thee, But wrought by life into a man—He passes to eternity."

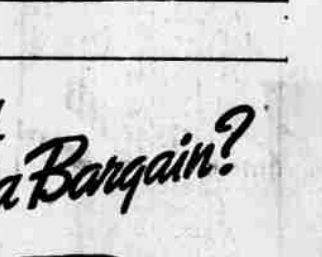
