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SCHMELING SAYS HE'LL BEAT LOUIS

NEW YORK, April 22.—(AP)—More concerned about his forgotten golf clubs than the terrors of Joe Louis' fists, Max Schmeling, the former heavyweight champion, today begins the search for a training camp in which to prepare for his 15-round fight with the Detroit bomber at the Yankee stadium in June.

Schmeling, calmly confident of his ability to beat Louis, arrived yesterday bewailing the fact he had left his golf clubs in Germany. He plans to start his preparations at French Lick, Ind., with golf as his main diet.

This oversight worried Max even more than the fact that he and his trainer, Max Machon, didn't even have taxi fare to their hotel when they arrived. They were allowed to take only ten marks apiece—about \$4—out of Germany.

Schmeling, weighing 192 pounds, about four pounds above his fighting weight, announced he was in fine condition and that he expected to beat Louis although he would not predict a knockout.

"It is now or never for me," he explained. "I know I will never get another chance in an important bout here unless I can beat you, Joe Louis; that's what I intend to do."

Peace May Bring War.

THE end of the Ethiopian war—which never was formally declared—nearly in spite of the fact that Emperor Haile Selassie, king of kings, is in the field leading his troops and has had small success in stopping the southward march of the Italians, he is against overwhelming odds. The war will soon be over and the king of kings may be compelled to flee for his life.

Italy has, or shortly will have, achieved a victory on the African continent the result of which will be to place Italy in a position to challenge the dominance of England in Egypt and Africa. Apparently this is the completion of an important step in Mussolini's dream of the restoration of the former Roman Empire.

England, the greatest sea power on earth and the nation whose flag flies on all continents, is most concerned for her position in the east is definitely threatened. Sooner or later the Italians will test the strength of their mosquito fleet against the apparent power of England's dreadnaughts. The Italians have relatively few large ships but have more than 2000 fast little boats, carrying a crew of three men and armed with two large torpedoes.

With Italy in control of Ethiopia it seems really more likely that there will be conflict between Italy and England than that France and Germany will fight one another.

Rescued.

THE dramatic rescue of the two men entombed in an old mine shaft up in Nova Scotia, has aroused the interest of the entire American continent. The story of the heroism of the rescue workers is another chapter in the history of the noble deeds of mankind.

It was no simple task. The tunnel dug to reach the men was through earth and rock. There was no time for adequate supporting. Slides and falls were common and delayed the progress. It was a dangerous task but the rescue workers carried on.

As we go through our workaday world it must sometimes seem that selfishness and greed dominate human actions, but that is not true. Heroism, willingness to sacrifice, if necessary to aid another in distress, are qualities possessed in generous measure. We sometimes forget they are there for the lack of opportunity for their use. The rescue in Nova Scotia reminds us once more that we humans are not such bad creatures after all.

DETREMENT FORESEEN IF HIGHWAY IS REROUTED

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 22.—Editor News-Review.—It seems that nothing in late years has so stirred up a controversy or united the people of Roseburg as has the proposed changing of the Pacific highway from Jackson street to Stephens. The latest resolution of the city council, passed Monday night with only one dissenting vote, might be likened to Pope's "Rape of the Lock." It is my opinion that in the next ten years we will rue greatly the move if made and that the "Rape of Roseburg" will go down in Roseburg's history as the biggest mistake ever made.

As soon as the highway is started, there will be buildings constructed there for business. One or two places on Jackson street will move there and soon there will be vacant store buildings on the main street of the largest municipality in Douglas county. As examples of what has happened in the past, look at Riddle and Gledale. I can recall when both of these places were thriving and prosperous communities. It has always been my opinion that the highway was for the purpose of building up the state and its subdivisions, but in those two instances it certainly worked with a vengeance the other way. We now have a crooked snaky highway which misses both of those towns and will have to be entirely reconstructed before it will conform to the idealistic idea of some of our state engineers. In the two towns mentioned, property values were ruined BUT I WILL BET TEN DOLLARS THAT THEIR TAXES ARE HIGHER NOW THAN WHEN THE HIGHWAY WENT THROUGH THEIR TOWN.

And I will venture the prediction that the same thing will happen to our city. Another shining example is in our own city with the removal of the S. P. terminal. Maybe it didn't make any difference to some people, but I can name a large number who saw the difference. And have the tax bills to the owners of Sheridan street property had a substantial reduction?

The main argument for the change seems to be that there are two right angle turns and one angle turn on Winchester street. Those two turns take up at least one minute of time in getting out of Roseburg. We are constantly talking about saving time and trying to get drivers to slow down, but here we are again making it possible for them to get through town in less time than ever, and at a place where speed is not to be desired, past the junior high school.

In a conversation with R. D. Bridges of Oakland he said that the next move is missing Oakland and Sutherland altogether with a consequent reduction of property values (but no reduction in taxes, I bet).

Where is the actual location of the highway in Eugene? Does it miss the main section of the city or does it pass the store of a certain former highway commissioner?

It seems impossible to get action on the North Umpqua highway probably because it would interfere with the road from Medford and the Skyline trail from Eugene.

In closing, let me ask all the property owners on Jackson street to get together and harmonize on that grand old song, "The Rape of Roseburg."
