DIVORCE ACTION REOPENING ASKED

An order for appearance in connection with a motion for the reopening of the divorce action of Leonard Earl Garrison against Estelle Mae Garrison has been issued by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly. The defendant has petitioned the court to set aside the divorce decree given May 27, 1935, and asks for an opportunity to appear and answer the complaint.

The affidavit supporting the motion declares that at the time the complaint was filed, the defendant was ill as a result of worry over domestic difficulties, was frightened and lacked funds for defense. The court is requested to reopen the case and permit the defendant to file answer to the charges of the original complaint.
