Steve O'Neill, of the square jaw and steady eye, has moulded a cohesive band of ball players who will fight you down the line until the last ball has been pitched and the last blow struck. The Indians have been thumping the horseshoe with vigor and their pitching staff better as the season moves along.

Harder, Hildebrand, Allen, Lloyd Brown and Blalsholder all have been showing plenty of stuff and if Hildin takes a new lease on life the Indians will have a pitching staff that may make the fans forget about the Tigers, the Red Sox, the Yankees and the rest. Trasky, the fence buster; Averill, Voornik and Campbell seem capable of taking care of the heavy batting chores.

Trasky is leading the league in home runs with five and his 14 runs batted in is the only one behind Bill Dickey of the Yankees.

Blalsholder came into his own in his first start of the season yesterday when he held the St. Louis Browns to seven hits and won his game 2-1 but it was Campbell's homer in the seventh that provided the winning run.

VAN WINKLE GIVES FIRE PATROL RULING

SALEM, April 27.—(AP)—Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle ruled today that the state forester may list all owners of timber and fire hazard lands whose forest patrol assessments are delinquent for one or more years and to notify such owners of their responsibility for any fires which may occur on their lands.

Van Winkle said the notice would not add anything to the liability of such owners but it would have a tendency to promote observance of the statutes relating to fire protection.
