

## TAKE JOBS OR GET NO RELIEF, EDICT

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—Pressing their drive to which work relief rolls, WPA officials said today the needy must accept offers of farm or other private employment.

Opening up of the entire planting season is expected by Harry F. Cantor, a laborer who has sold recently more than 100,000 bushels of wheat.

It was said another 100,000 is expected to find employment on WPA highways and other relief projects.

Officials recalled that relief was taken away last year from the needy in North Dakota and other states who refused jobs on farms.

The same policy will be followed this year, they asserted.

WPA employment officials began April 29 on March 7 to 9, 1935, and April 18, but officials said they did not know what the effect of the decrease was caused by farm employment.

They pointed out that WPA has been figuring on a basis of 100,000 unemployed, but that the actual number is now 150,000.

Penalties that most counties imposed on farmers who refused to take on WPA labor for the planting season of 1935, and that the WPA has been urging farmers to accept, are now under way in the middle west.

## FARM DEBT VOTE PETITION FILLED

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—The 218 names needed on a petition to force the Frazier-Lemke farm mortgage refinancing bill to a house vote were obtained today.

For two sessions democratic leaders have been seeking to force a vote on the bill, opposed by the administration as inflationary.

Some house observers feared the sudden signing of the petition to results of some recent primary elections.

The measure would authorize the government to issue new money in the amount of \$100,000,000, which would be used to refinance farm mortgages at 14 per cent each, reduced and interest over an estimated 47-year period.

The house agriculture committee approved the bill early last session, but it has been held in the rules committee since.

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## PRICE UNFAIRNESS BARRIER APPROVED

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—The senate today passed by voice vote the Robinson bill making the granting or acceptance of price discriminations unlawful.

The measure was passed after Senator Vandenberg (R., Mich.), succeeded on a second attempt, in having the scope of the bill limited to merchandising. This action eliminated industrial production from the measure's prohibitions.

Shortly before the final vote the senate adopted an amendment offered by Senator Capper (D., Kan.), making the acceptance of price discriminations unlawful. An originally drafted the measure applied solely to the granting of discriminations.

Another amendment, offered by Senator Kline (D., Utah), exempted the mineral industry from the provisions of the bill.

Chief provisions of the bill provide: 1—A prohibition against price discriminations between purchasers of commodities of like grade and quality; 2—Suppression of pseudo-advertising allowances; 3—A ban against false brokerage or commission; 4—Allocation of power to the federal trade commission to limit unfairly discounts in certain instances.

Individuals with net income of more than \$25,000 a year, and that about 45 per cent would be received by individuals with net incomes in excess of \$100,000 a year.

Inequalities Would Go

Harvesting said the effect of the new tax plan would be "to lower taxes for a great many, perhaps the great majority of our corporations, and to lower them also for a very large proportion of corporation stockholders."

"I feel that the house bill," he continued, "provides the basis for an excellent and productive revenue measure."

In the first place it would remove great existing inequalities in the taxation of incorporated and unincorporated business, as well as in the treatment of business profits generally.

In the second place it would increase the federal revenues by eliminating important sources of tax avoidance rather than by increasing existing tax rates or imposing new taxes.

vetism, and let the western wing of the party take the program or leave it. What caused the change?

Echo answers, but the proximity of events sometimes is significant. Certainly it is possible that the hundreds of thousands of republican votes cast in recent primaries for William E. Borah have made themselves heard by the wise old senator politicians whose ardent

desire is, after all, to win the election.

Leaders Like Steiwer.

The situation regarding Senator Steiwer's presidential prospects, while still nebulous, is somewhat further advanced than the public has been told.

Several weeks ago he made a little-advertised speech in New York. Among his hearers were several important eastern leaders, who liked his looks. Thereafter he was treated out as keynoteer at a number of republican state conventions. There is no question now that he has influential friends who believe he might be the ideal answer to a deadlock.

Beyond that the idea seems unlikely to go until convention time—if ever. Some of Senator Steiwer's intimates say he has no desire to bid for the nomination. Yet it is hard to tell what a deadlocked convention might do.

And after 1936 comes 1940. Again there may be no true analogy of events, but most politicians are convinced that it was the favorable impression made by Mr. Harding as the 1916 keynoteer which nominated him in 1920 and put him in the White House.
