

CARDS BEAT GIANTS IN 17-FRAME GAME

**Parmelee Holds Ex-Mates
to 6 Hits; Boston Grabs
Lead in American.**

Outstanding among superlative
pitching performances in yester-
day's major league baseball games
was Parmelee's 17-inning, six-hit,
2-1 victory for the Cardinals over
the New York Giants. In picking
out for this year's National league
pennant, the experts have agreed
that the success or failure of Par-
melee would be the success or fail-
ure of the Cards. Yesterday's per-
formance should throw some light
on the question.

Though he lost, Hubbell gave
the Cards only 11 hits in the 17
frames, which is pretty good pitch-
ing when the St. Louis crew faces
you 60 times in an afternoon.
Other pitching performances of
the day included Appleton's two-
hit, 7-3 victory for Washington over
the Tigers; Lee's four hit, 1-0 win
over the four-hit pitching of Mun-
ro of the Brooklyn Dodgers; and
Gomez's three-hitter over the Cleve-
land Indians, which dropped the
tribe from first to third in the
American league. The score of this
one was 6-1.

While so many extraordinary
things were stealing the show, the
Boston Red Sox defeated the Chi-
cago White Sox, 8-7, and regained
first place in the American league.
The game between the Phillies
and the Pirates ended in an anti-
climax in the 11th inning when
pitcher Walter intentionally walk-
ed two men to fill the bases and in
the process got into the habit of
throwing wild and hit Rube, Pi-
rates' first baseman, forcing in the
winning run. The score was 10-9.
Rhodes held the St. Louis
Browns to four hits for eight in-
nings and then was raked for three
hits and four runs in the ninth but
the Athletics won 7 to 4 for their
seventh triumph of the season.
