ROME, May 1.—Italy, preparing for a general mobilization or "adunata" in celebration of victory against Ethiopia, was informed today that the most recent fascist advance in east Africa cost the two sides 8,550 casualties.

Marshal Badoglio reported that his southern forces had occupied Hargeisa, 150 miles southeast of Harar, after capturing Sana Haneh, 25 miles away, in a 16-day fight. He further announced:

"One (Italian) airplane flew over the aviation field at Addis Ababa. It ran into violent machine gun fire from near a camp in the center of the city and, struck many times, it returned to its base."

In Boston, the Veterans of Foreign Wars' auxiliary and members of the communist party organized simultaneous demonstrations within hearing distance of each other.

Elsewhere in many cities of the United States, industrial plants closed while workers paraded and held addresses.

Many families took a holiday and went picnicking and on a number of college campuses festivals took place with dancing around the Maypole.

BAN ON MASONRY CAUSES 5 ARRESTS

ROME, April 30.—(AP)—A local source said today five functionaries of the ministry of finance had been arrested on the charge that they had taken part in the formation of a Masonic lodge.

It was said that they were alleged to have been in communication with English and French lodges.

Premier Mussolini ordered the dissolution of all secret societies including the Masonic, several years ago on the grounds that such organizations endangered the state.

TOWNSEND TO BE QUINNED ON PERMITS

"We were to build Dr. Townsend up as a great leader," he testified. "We were to get him up on a pedestal. And we also agreed to hold him in the background."

"Why in the background?" the witness was asked. The reply: "Because he had a tendency to refute his own statements. The growth of membership was retarded by his contradictory public statements."

Money Rolls In
Edward E. Gordon, who left the profession of undertaker to become southern California manager for Dr. Townsend, testified that since July, 1935, he personally received \$15,253.49.

From July, 1935, to March of this year, Gordon continued, the 300 Townsend clubs in his area paid into the organization coffers \$124,677.47.

Area managers throughout the nation, the witness testified, got 10 per cent of new members' dues, and 20 per cent of the monthly quota of 10 cents a member.

Managers are required to pay half the amount to their organizations, he added.

Gordon said he could not remember the size of several "Christmas club" bank accounts.

"We need the figures on those Santa Claus bank accounts to get an idea of your income," said Representative Cawagan.

Messengers were dispatched to the banks to get the figures.

Merriam Denies Deal
In Sacramento, Gov. Frank E. Merriam said he never heard of any "deal" such as Townsend testified about.

The testimony was about a purported agreement whereby \$25,000 was to be paid by Merriam campaign managers for campaign support from Townsend followers.

"If there was such an arrangement it is something for my southern California campaign representatives to answer. I'll see to it this is either answered by them or I'll answer it myself. I'll not let any such false assertion go unchallenged."

"I don't mind saying right now that in ordinary short language I think it is just a lie."
