Cochrane Joins Greenberg
on Injured List; Champs
Lose to Senators.

Mickey Cochrane, battling manager of the Detroit Tigers, awoke today with reason for sorrow reflection on the latest twist of fate.

Cochrane was hit by a foul in the losing game against the Senators yesterday and his injury was so bad that he was expected to be out of the lineup for three days. He will join Hank Greenberg on the sidelines, the latter suffering from a fractured wrist that is expected to keep him out of action for six weeks.

This is the third time in the young season that Cochrane has been forced out of action by physical disability. An injured thumb and eye trouble forced him to forego action on two other occasions.

A ninth-inning single that threw him down the third base line scored Myer with the run that gave the Senators an 8-7 victory.

KOUPAL'S VICTORY STREAK IS HALTED
