MARCH BUTTERFAT HONORS ANNOUNCED

CORVALLIS, May 4.—(AP)—Top honors for March butterfat production among members of the Oregon herd improvement association went to Washington county.

Of the Washington association averaged 745 pounds of milk and 23.89 pounds of fat from 630 cows with the Oregon Independent association of Multnomah county second, average 888.6 pounds of milk and 22.6 pounds of fat from 222 cows.

The Yamhill association was third and the Lin-Benton group fourth.

The high producing herd was that of P. M. Lamb, of Lin-Benton, his 10 cows averaging 891.6 pounds of milk and 27.07 pounds of fat, and David Hagg and Sons, Washington county, had the high producing cow, Jersey, with a record of 4615 pounds of milk and 98.5 pounds of fat.

DEDICATION SET FOR COAST SPANS

SALEM, May 4.—(AP)—The coming week-end will see the start of events toward which residents along the 465-mile Oregon coast have looked for more than 29 years—dedication of the coast bridges which will close the gap permitting continued motor travel along the Pacific ocean.

The first of the five dedicatory programs will be held at Waldport May 8-10, when the new Alsea bay bridge will be officially recognized. The Alsea bridge, however, is the third of the five to be opened and the third in size, but initial formalities have been scheduled there.

This program will be followed by ceremonies at Florence for the Siuslaw bridge May 23 and 24 and at North Bend for the Coos bay bridge June 5-7. The other two, at Reedsport and at Newport, have not been set, but all bridges will be in use by September 1, the state highway department announced.

The two not yet completed are the Unquiqu and Yaquina bay spans, at Reedsport and Newport respectively. The five-bridge program will bring to completion a coast highway at a cost of \$25,000,000. The bridges alone, including the one over the sixth waterway which is under the coast at Dogue river and completed in 1932, will approximate \$8,000,000.
