FEHL CASE STILL
PENDS AT SALEM

SALEM, May 5.—(AP)—Twenty days after he had refused a conditional pardon at the conclusion of his minimum term for participation in the Jackson county ballot thefts, Earl H. Fehl was still in the state penitentiary pending a decision on habeas corpus proceedings in the Marion county circuit court.

Judge L. H. McMahan said today he did not know when he would hand down a decision on the plea of Electa A. Fehl, wife of the prisoner, on her demand for his automatic release. Fehl had served the 32 months of his four-year sentence for participation in the ballot thefts, allowing for good time behavior.

An attorney general's opinion recently ended the practice at the penitentiary of releasing prisoners without parole at the expiration of their good-time sentence. He held a parole was necessary and that the release could not be automatic. Governor Martin had issued a conditional parole to Fehl prohibiting him from returning to Jackson county. Fehl refused the parole.

Delay in filing of briefs on the proceedings by both the prosecution and the defense was the reason given by Judge McMahan for uncertainty as to the date of the decision. Attorneys declared that in any event the case would be appealed to the state supreme court.
