details and features necessary to the preliminary work.

He met yesterday with committees on trophies and awards, balls, baseball, parades and drum corps and today held conferences with each of the other committees.

Particular attention is being given today to the major problem of housing and transportation.

Record Rally Forecast. Speaking before the regular meeting of Umpqua post last night, Mr. Moser stated that every indication points to a larger attendance at the Roseburg convention than any previous state meeting of the American Legion.

As the veterans will undoubtedly have received their bonus payments prior to the convention dates, a great number will put aside a sum to provide participation in the gathering at Roseburg, Moser said.

A large attendance is also indicated by the fact that American Legion membership in Oregon is already ahead of any previous year at the same time, he told the local post.

The Roseburg post at its regular meeting last night adopted a resolution directed to the Oregon congressional delegation, urging that Roseburg be made a pay-off station for bonus bonds. The resolution points out the need for a station here for cashing the bonds, due to the concentration of veterans at Roseburg due to the location here of the veterans administration facility.

To Back Home Campaign. The post also arranged to sponsor a model home campaign in which the Coen Lumber company will cooperate. The home is to be built in a suitable location and will be thoroughly modern in every particular. Money secured from admissions will be used in the convention fund. The home will be given away as a prize in a contest to be made a part of the campaign.

Ward Cummings of the Junior baseball committee reported on the work of his group, and announced a practice game Sunday. Admission to the game will be free.

The Memorial day committee reported plans being completed for the annual exercises for May 30. Announcement was made that the local squadron of Sons of Legion is increasing in membership and will meet Friday night at the Parish hall.
