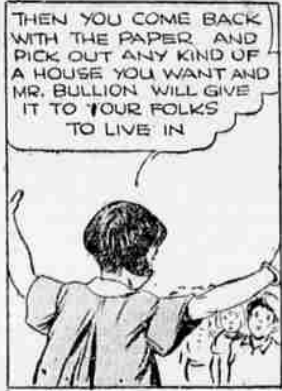

POLICY ON FOREST CODE IS ADOPTED

A definite policy covering the general observance of the forest code by the various operators throughout the state has been adopted by the board of forestry, according to an announcement made recently by Fred L. Southwick, district warden of the Douglas County Fire Patrol association. This policy places the responsibility of applying for operators' permits as well as providing the necessary equipment, upon the operator himself. Since the forest code has been effective for a number of years and a special effort has been made in the past to inform the operators of the provisions of the code, especially the operator's permit law, it is felt that the industry should be sufficiently familiar with all code provisions to take all action necessary without waiting for a first inspection by an official of the state forester's office.

Applications for operator's permits must be made prior to May 15, the beginning of the closed season, and failure to make such application will necessitate closing of the operation until the application is received and acted upon. In the case of new operations, or where one moves to a new location during the closed season, application should be made long enough in advance so as to allow the state forester's office to prepare the permit. The necessary blanks for making applications can be secured at the office of the Douglas County Fire Patrol association in Roseburg, Oregon, or by getting in touch with either the District Warden Fred L. Southwick or L. C. Cummings, inspector.

In connection with the provisions of the code covering the equipment necessary in operations as well as precautionary measures in hazard reduction, the operator will be expected to carry out all these provisions prior to May 15, without awaiting special instructions from a forest official. Inspection of all equipment will be carried out at frequent intervals throughout the fire season.

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

GRANTS PASS, May 6.—(AP)—Josephine county led the entire state in percentage of farm population increase and was fourth in numerical increase from April 1, 1930, to January 1, 1935, analysis here of federal census figures just released reveals.

Josephine county headed the percentage column with a gain of 43 per cent. Curry county was next with 35 per cent, and Douglas third with 28 per cent. The state in general gained 11.2 per cent. Of the 36 counties, Clackamas,

Douglas and Lane were the only ones reporting greater gain in actual number of persons.
