

# Legion Junior Baseball Prospects Here Bright

## MATERIAL APLENTY FROM 7 LOCALITIES

Keen Competition Assured By High Playing Ability of Berth Applicants.

American Legion junior baseball prospects in Roseburg are more encouraging than for several seasons, according to Ward Cummings, chairman, who states that more than 80 boys have already registered for the activity.

Indications, he states, are for the biggest team Douglas county has ever had, while playing ability is also above average.

Seven players from last year's squad are out for positions, but newcomers are expected to give the veterans tough competition and few players are yet assured of regular berths.

Roseburg, Myrtle Creek, Glendale, Sutherlin, Oakland, Biddle and Dillard are all contributing players to the county team.

In fact, the Myrtle Creek high school team can be used almost intact in Legion baseball this year, as with but three exceptions the boys are inside the age limitations.

The presence of veterans from last year's team will give the county team the advantage of the experience of those players, Cummings reports, and will exert a steady effect on the squad as a whole.

The baseball committee this year has worked out a plan to provide sport for boys of all ages.

**Midsets Also to Rump**  
The Midset league will be re-commenced this season to provide baseball for boys below the age for the junior team. This activity is of particular importance, Cummings points out, in developing material for future state competition.

Heretofore the problem has been to furnish sport for boys who are just beyond the junior baseball age. As the age of 17 years is the limit of eligibility, boys who have played on the Legion teams are too young in most cases for an adult team, yet above the age for active baseball participation in order to keep up their ability until they are able to compete on adult squads.

This has been solved by placing members of last year's team in charge of groups of Midsets.

Boys like Scherner, Baker, Shinn and others who have shown unusual baseball ability and who will doubtless advance in baseball, are to coach and manage teams of midsets, which will be organized into a league.

In this manner the older boys not only keep up their interest in baseball, but they develop leadership training and at the same time preserve the benefits of the training they have been given by passing it on to others.

**Segregation by Ages**  
Another feature of this year's Midset league will be a division into age groups, made possible by the increased leadership furnished by the older boys. Heretofore a problem has been the age differences. Boys not quite good enough for junior ball, yet old enough to play with the junior group, objected to being grouped with the still younger boys. It will now be possible, as a result of the number of available coaches, to build teams according to age and a very successful season is in prospect, Cummings states.

Greater attention is being given to junior baseball this year than ever before as the Oregon-Washington state playoff is to be in Roseburg during the state convention of the American Legion in August. The local sponsors have hopes that the Douglas county team will be the state contender to meet the Washington champions, but regardless of the team winning the Oregon title the finals of the Oregon-Washington district championships will be played here.

Carl Moser, state assistant of the American Legion, will visit today with Mr. Cummings and his committee to arrange details connected with the three-game series to decide the title.

The teams will play Thursday and Friday afternoons, August 13 and 14, according to present plans, with a third game on Saturday if necessary.

Roseburg is to furnish housing and meals for the players, while transportation to and from the city will be paid by the national organization of the American Legion.

**ACTIVITIES SPLIT FAVORED AT O. S. C.**  
CORVALLIS, Ore., May 6.—(AP)—Athletic and educational activities will be administered separately if the recommendations of the Oregon State college president's committee are carried out.

Marvin Wilbur, editor of the Daily Barometer and spokesman for the committee, said the group favored placing in the educational activity category the following: Publications, forensics, band, orchestra, glee club, student body officers and women's athletics.

It was not determined whether the group would recommend that athletics be maintained separately or placed under the department of physical education. Action of the committee is subject to approval by President George W. Peavy, the chancellor and the state educational board.

## DISPENSERS DISCUSS CONVENTION PLANS

Plans for the state convention here for the State Food and Beverage Dispensers association, were discussed last night at the meeting held at Carl's Tavern. The meeting was attended by Douglas county dispensers and was addressed by A. H. Aehl, state president of the dispensers' organization.

Wallace Rapp, general chairman, received reports from the various committees, and it was announced that all arrangements are being ably handled.

A large attendance is anticipated for the meeting, which starts June 21 for three days, as the dispensers of the state are making a vigorous campaign to secure better control of the handling of beverages and to eliminate objectionable features in the present regulations, and to add restrictions which would be a protection to beer dispensers against complications caused by hard liquor.

## HIGHWAY BUILDING WILL RISE HERE

The state highway commission, at its meeting to be held May 21 and 22, will award contracts for the construction of an office building on the state property in the south part of Roseburg. It was announced at Portland today.

The building is to be a one-story frame structure, and will house the office now located in the courthouse. The division office, bridge and engineering department forces will be moved into the new building, according to present plans.

Specifications for the structure were drawn two years ago, and bids were received when the present maintenance shed was built. Money was lacking, however, to erect the office building at that time.

lary school districts within the county equalization districts from any and all sources.

Against authority being given to any committee of either branch of the legislature by which such committee could determine what bills shall be considered.

Against any general sales tax on the necessities of life.

For legislation to make the control and regulation of the sale of alcoholic beverages more effective.

Local Option Favored  
For a precinct local option law for control of liquor traffic.

To repeal the present gambling law by which horse racing and the racing of other animals is licensed by the state.

Against legislation of any kind which destroys or intrudes upon the rights of the people in free speech, free assembly and the right of petition.

To abolish compulsory military training in the public schools and in the institutions of higher learning in the state of Oregon and establish optional military training in its place.

To amend the Oregon motor vehicle laws of the state so as to provide for a low license fee, together with a provision for the placing of motor vehicles on the tax to be collected at the time that license to operate is issued, the revenue resulting from the tax to be returned to the counties.

## TERRIBLE TURK PINS TERRIBLE GERMAN

Ali Baba Twists Mythical Wrestling Title From Herr Shikat.

By DALE HARRISON (Associated Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, May 6.—(AP)—Ali Baba, the terrible Turk from the United States navy, is now the world's heavyweight wrestling champion, as those things go; and the "wrestling trust" can take it or leave it.

All Baba (born Arsen Ekizian) took Mr. Dick Shikat, the terrible Turk, in hand at Madison Square garden last night and threw him hither and thither with gusto and abandon. After 53 minutes and 37 seconds of that sort of thing, Mr. Baba (265 lbs.) got a croch hold on Mr. Shikat (227) and heaved him heavily to the mat.

As Mr. Shikat lay there trying to remember if he had left the light on in the bathroom at home, Mr. Baba leaped upon him with a body press and the week's wrestling match of the century was over.

Ali may be slowing up, because it took him only 46 minutes and 49 seconds to destroy Shikat's faith in human nature at their former meeting, in Detroit, April 25.

Two or three times during the roughhouse last night Mr. Baba appeared to be in agony, but the grunting was about even. Shikat groaned loudest, but the Kurd put more feeling in his.

Mr. Joe Humphreys, the world famous announcer, introduced Ali Baba as "a new terror type of Turk," thereby frightening a couple of customers into a sound sleep.

## All Shows Dignity

After it was over, Ali Baba consented to have his arm held aloft while he was proclaimed "champion of the world," and he bowed like an ambassador. There was none of that ribald stuff like "hello, mom, hello, pop." He is the dignified type.

All the time Ali was bowing, Shikat was rolling around on the floor growling like nobody's business, but the bout was over, and the grunts didn't count.

The printed program stated that "no wrestler appearing on this card is under the control of the wrestling trust." This was very cheering to the customers of course.

Mr. Ali Baba's mustaches fascinated Herr Shikat, and on two occasions he reached out and yanked them with great care. Such tactics are frowned upon by all lovers of good clean sport, and the referee reprimanded Mr. Shikat severely.

Mr. Baba was by far the most courteous of the two behemoths of brawl, for every time he happened to sock Mr. Shikat in the nose he put forth his ring hand, indicating he was ready and willing to forget his mistakes.

Shikat had no time to be shaking hands, most of his minutes being occupied with figuring out ways and means of keeping from being pinned to the mat, which is the object of the game.

## N. Y. RULING HITS RACE TRACK BETS

ALBANY, N. Y., May 6.—(AP)—Attorney General John J. Bennett, Jr., ruled today that betting at New York race tracks is illegal.

The opinion was handed down at the request of democratic Senate Leader John J. Dunnigan.

After quoting from an article in the state constitution and two sections of the penal law, the attorney general held:

"From these provisions, I conclude that betting at race tracks is illegal in New York state. However, whereas the offense was formerly a misdemeanor and punishable as such, the legislature under the laws of 1926 as amended in 1934 has made a civil forfeiture the sole penalty therefor."

Victory of the Roosevelt slate, personally endorsed by the president, as proof he will carry the state as he did in 1932.

William H. Nebbett, law partner of United States Senator William C. McAdoo and chairman of the Roosevelt for president campaign committee in southern California, declared:

"This will serve notice to the entire nation that President Roosevelt's liberal policies have gained a host of supporters who will not be shaken loose either by smoke-screen propaganda or by cunningly devised campaigns of misinformation."

Roosevelt's slate carried every county in California by wide margins.

G. O. P. Splits Vote  
The two republican tickets, on incomplete returns, divided the counties in the state almost evenly. The uninstructed delegation gained its margin by carrying all of the larger counties—Alameda, Los Angeles, San Diego and Santa Clara counties.

LONDON, "SATISFIED" WITH RESULTS OF PRIMARIES  
TOPEKA, Kan., May 6.—(AP)—Mr. M. Landon, republican presidential possibility, said in a state-

## ment today he was "entirely satisfied" with results of the California and South Dakota presidential primaries and the Tennessee republican state convention.

"The republican voters of California, Tennessee and South Dakota have made their choice as to the persons they desire to represent them in Cleveland," the Kansas governor said.

"This is as it should be and I am entirely satisfied. What we must have," he added, "is a nomination by the choice of a majority of republicans, as ascertained from the opportunities they have had to express themselves."

## In Other States

South Dakota—An uninstructed slate claimed by supporters of Governor Landon held slight lead over Senator Borah of Idaho with returns incomplete in the contest for eight delegates to the republican convention. On the democratic side a slate of eight pledged to President Roosevelt had no opposition.

Alabama—Senator John H. Bankhead and his brother, William B. Bankhead, house democratic leader, received majorities in yesterday's primary. President Roosevelt won the state's 22 convention votes without opposition.

Missouri—Democratic state convention pledged Missouri's 30 votes at the national convention to President Roosevelt.

Tennessee—Republican state convention endorsed Landon and pledged the state's four delegates-at-large to him.

Connecticut—Republicans assembled in convention today to select delegates to the 1936 national convention.

Indiana—All of the state's 12 members of the national house of representatives appeared assured of re-nomination, although the count of yesterday's primary votes was incomplete.

Dr. A. J. Melly, leader of the British ambulance unit in Ethiopia, who was wounded Sunday during native riots in Addis Ababa, died last night in the British legation.

He was shot in the lungs while dragging wounded in from the streets.

## SWITZERLAND BELIEVED SELASSIE'S DESTINATION

VEVEY, Switzerland, May 6.—"Flowerly Meadow," believed to be the destination of the fleeing Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia, is a 21-room villa built in 1897.

The house stands in the center of a large estate now overgrown with vegetation, bought by the negus in 1930. It was occupied each summer until 1934, when it was closed. The estate includes a small lake, fountain, and extensive orchards of apples and pears.

## EUROPE NOW AT DANGER POINT, OBSERVER STATES

PARIS, May 6.—Julius Sauerwein, diplomatic correspondent of the newspaper Paris-Sol, wrote today that Italy's victory in Ethiopia has brought Europe to a danger point.

"Since he wishes to resume his position in Geneva and in Europe, I must see to it that Geneva is something better than a wreck and that Europe is not a place where all avenues are closed before him."

"It is of capital importance that he should not try to add to his success a victory of prestige and of form."
