ROME, May 7.—Total annexation of Ethiopia, the best informed sources said today, will be decreed Saturday night by Italy's grand council of fascism and by her cabinet ministers.

It is expected they will present to the league of nations council, meeting at Geneva Monday, an accomplished fact which Italians believe will permit of no league discussion.

This apparently authoritative prediction came upon the heels of reports by the Stefani (Italian) news agency that Italian troops in Ethiopia had seized complete control of the French-owned Addis Ababa-Djibouti railroad, all the way to the French Somaliland border.

PARIS, May 7.—(AP)—France is not ready to relinquish her rights to the Addis Ababa-Djibouti railroad, sole modern public carrier in the fallen empire of Ethiopia, official sources stated today.

These sources denied reports that Italian troops already had "requisitioned" the rail line. Transfer of the line could be brought about only by a free convention negotiated between the French company which owns it and an Italian concern, it was stated.

ADDIS ABABA, May 7.—The new Italian administration of Addis Ababa took a firm hold on the reins of authority today, enlisting even former imperial Ethiopian police for the task of restoring order.

Major Bottai, governor of Rome and new civil governor of Addis Ababa, directed a roundup of members of Emperor Haile Selassie's force who had not taken to the hills.

The relations of all foreigners with Italian military and civil authorities were being reviewed.

MARBLE GAMING
RULED UNLAWFUL
SALEM, May 7.—(AP)—So-called marble games are primarily lotteries and are a violation of the Oregon laws, Ralph Moody, deputy attorney general and special prosecutor for gambling investigations in Marion county, announced last night.

Moody declared that all games of chance in the county must go, regardless of whether or not they involve an element of skill.

Moody said the state did not need to prove that the element of chance predominated in any game, but that if the game involved any degree of gambling it was banned by Oregon.

LANDON NOSES
OUT BORAH IN
SOUTH DAKOTAKansas's Victory Margin
Under 1,000; California
Demo Vote 3rd More
Than G.O.P. Total.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., May 7.—(AP)—Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas won South Dakota's eight republican presidential preference delegates in Tuesday's primary by less than 1,000 votes, on the basis of nearly complete but unofficial returns tabulated today.

Returns from 1,919 of the state's 1,958 precincts gave the Landon-placed slate, which was listed on the ballot as unaffiliated, 42,702 votes compared with 11,729 for Senator William E. Borah. This was a majority of 573 for the Kansas.

Although not legally bound to vote for Landon at the Cleveland convention next June, the delegates have pledged themselves to support him as long as he appears to have a chance for the presidential nomination.

CALIFORNIA DEMO VOTE
3RD BIGGER THAN G.O.P.'s
SAN FRANCISCO, May 7.—(AP)—Closing tabulations in Tuesday's presidential primary revealed today a total democratic vote more than one-third greater than the republican in an election which brought out more than 55 per cent of California's qualified voters.

The Associated Press closing tabulation, based on 11,162 precincts out of 11,708 in the state showed a total democratic vote of 928,917 and a total republican vote of 588,294, or a grand total of 1,517,211.

The democratic delegates pledged to President Roosevelt received more than four times the number of votes for two other slates combined.

The uninstructed republican slate received 237,945 votes compared to 250,549 for the group pledged to Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas. Governor Landon commented in Topeka he was "entirely satisfied."

The delegation pledged to Roosevelt received 768,617 votes. Up on Sinclair's "EP" slate received 161,403 votes, and Representative John S. McQuarrie's Townsendite delegation, 58,897. Each of the latter two avowedly favored President Roosevelt, but sought victory in order to bring platform suggestions before the democratic convention.

HOOVER SEES BENEFIT IN
CALIFORNIA G. O. P. VOTE
PALO ALTO, Calif., May 7.—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover commented briefly today on the California presidential primary.

"The result of the primary election puts the republican party in California in better shape to defeat the democrats," he said.

OF UMPQUA CLOSING

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 7.—(AP)—M. T. Hoy, master fish warden of Oregon, said here that available information will not warrant the closing of the Umpqua river to commercial fishing.

At a recent hearing in Portland sportsmen and chamber of commerce officials from Roseburg urged that the river be closed to commercial fishing for two years to permit an increase in salmon.

Fishermen from the lower portion of the river opposed such closing.

Red Flag Flies Over U.S. High Court
Unknown Prankster Jars Capital

WASHINGTON, May 7.—(AP)—An amazed capital awoke today to find the red flag of communism flying over the huge marble temple of the supreme court of the United States.

Apparently raised in the night by a prankster, the fluttering emblem struck consternation into the ranks of the supreme court guard, picked men assigned to protect the dignity of the nation's highest tribunal.

Finally a fireman mounted a lofty extension ladder. Swaying precariously, he touched the flag with a gasoline torch tied to the end of a long pole. The emblem caught fire and was destroyed.

The government began a wide hunt for the prankster who had raised the banner bearing the hammer and sickle. Authorities said they found a copy of the Harvard Lampoon at the base of the flagstaff.

The incident provided much merriment to a crowd of early morning passersby, who gathered at the scene offering advice and philosophical comment.

CRAZED CONVICT
STABS 11; KILLED

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Calif., May 7.—(AP)—Eleven convicts were recovering in San Quentin prison today from stab wounds inflicted by a crazed Filipino who amuck in a crowded shed before a guard killed him.

As some 200 convicts chatted in the shed late yesterday, Frank Dagne, Filipino murderer, suddenly began slashing wildly at his companions with a crude knife fashioned from fence wire.

Screams attracted Guard Charles Rexroad. Because of the crowded condition of the shed, it was some time before he could fire. As it was the bullet that killed Dagne also struck Rafael Aquila, 31, another convicted killer, in the ankle.

KILLED BY GUNMEN

LA CONA, N. Y., May 7.—(AP)—Charles M. Salisbury, 78, president of the Lacona National bank, was shot and killed today by one of two youthful robbers, who escaped.

The gunmen, who entered the bank announcing "this is a stick-up," fled without taking any money.

AID INDUSTRY
TO GIVE JOBS,
HOPKINS SAYSCongress Advised to Plan
Cooperation Rather Than
Consider Permanent
Relief Set-Up.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—(AP)—Congress was advised today by Relief Administrator Harry L. Hopkins that it would do better to think out some plan of government cooperation with industry to increase employment than to consider now any permanent program of relief.

This advice was disclosed as the house began considering a \$1,500,000 allowance for Hopkins' works progress administration for the 1937 fiscal year. This amount, he told the appropriations committee during hearings made public today, will not be enough unless private employment picks up.

Hopkins told the committee the appropriation would enable WPA to provide work for an average of 2,000,000 persons throughout the year, compared with the March peak of 3,500,000. He said the present plan was to drop approximately 750,000 in the next few months and have around 2,300,000 actually employed on July 1, 1936.

He agreed with Rep. Bacon (R., N. Y.) that "unless private industry absorbs a good many of these to another message when the next congress meets" asking for additional funds.

Gives Spending Plans
The administrator gave the following division of his plans to spend the \$1,500,000, subject to a 5 or 10 per cent fluctuation:

Highways, roads and streets, \$155,000,000 or 25 per cent; public buildings, \$165,000,000, 11 per cent; parks and other recreational facilities, \$165,000,000, 11 per cent; public utilities, including sewer systems, water supply and purification, airports and other transportation facilities, \$180,000,000, 12 per cent; flood control and other conservation, \$135,000,000, 9 per cent; white collar projects, \$90,000,000, 6 per cent; women's projects, \$90,000,000, 6 per cent; miscellaneous work projects, \$75,000,000, 5 per cent; national youth administration, \$75,000,000, 5 per cent; rural rehabilitation and relief to farmers (rural resettlement administration), \$90,000,000 or 6 per cent.

HYDE SCORES NEW
DEAL SQUANDERING

PORTLAND, May 7.—(AP)—Arthur M. Hyde told a republican audience here "the administration has attempted to squander the nation back to prosperity" and "the more abundant life" already had cost \$15,000,000,000.

"A system of government-controlled economics and finance . . . is alien to American ideals, hostile to American institutions and subversive to American form of government," he said.

Hyde, who formerly was governor of Missouri and secretary of agriculture in the Hoover administration, said the issue in the approaching campaign is "free economics versus collectivism; liberty versus dictatorship."

Zeppelin Winging Over Atlantic
On First Flight to United States

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ABOARD THE ZEPPELIN HINDBURG, EN ROUTE TO AMERICA, May 7.—The giant German airship Hindenburg, averaging 75 miles an hour, struck out across the North Atlantic today on its first flight to America.

Bright sunshine and clear skies prevailed.

Many of the 51 passengers remained awake all night to see the airship fly over the mouth of the Rhine and later glimpse the Isle of Wight, in the English channel off the southern coast of England, just as the sun rose.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—(AP)—J. Edgar Hoover announced today the capture of William Mahan, called the remaining principal in the \$200,000 Weyerhaeuser kidnapping.

Hoover said Mahan was taken in San Francisco this noon. He made the announcement upon returning to the capital from the arrest at Toledo, O., of Harry Campbell, pal of Alvin Karpis, who was wanted in connection with the Edward Bremer kidnapping and an Ohio mail robbery.

Hoover said Mahan had \$7,300 on his person when federal agents apprehended him on Miami street, between 6th and 7th avenues, in San Francisco.

Some of the money was Weyerhaeuser ransom money, Hoover said, on which the serial numbers had been altered.

Hoover said Mahan admitted his identity, but did not confess to the crime.

Hoover said Mahan was taken without any shots being fired. He was unarmed.

Mahan was being removed this afternoon to Tacoma, Washington, for arraignment for the May 24, 1935, kidnapping of 9-year-old George Weyerhaeuser. A \$200,000 ransom was paid for the boy's release.

Hoover said the ransom money had been turned up at regular intervals in various places in the Pacific northwest, with the serial numbers altered. Crime technicians in the bureau's laboratory here, he told newsmen, were able to identify positively the altered notes.

"Premier Mussolini declared 'the war is over and Ethiopia is Italian.'"

Mussolini then added:

"It is not without emotion and not without pride that after seven months of fierce hostilities I pronounce this great word."

PRIDE?

Well, if it is occasion for pride when a big, well-heeled bully goes out and beats up some poor, defenseless little devil and takes his possessions, Mussolini has some thing to be proud of.

ANOTHER dispatch, from Djibouti, in French Somaliland:

"Emperor Haile Selassie went in to exile laden with rich treasures. When the Ethiopian monarch said

ed aboard a British cruiser yesterday for Palestine, his possessions included the imperial family jewels and many cases of gold bullion, gold coins and Maria Theresa silver thalers.

"Even six automobiles were listed among the imperial belongings."

IT SEEMS a little tough that the emperor should depart in safety with the nation's treasures while the poor rascals who did the fighting and the dying remain behind to take whatever fate the victors may impose.

But such is the institution of royalty.
