RECORD WAR DEPT. MEASURE APPROVED

WASHINGTON, May 6 — (AP) — The house today adopted a conference report on the peace-time record war department appropriation bill and sent the \$52,464,344 measure to the senate for action on amendments still undecided. The measure directs an increase in enlisted army strength to 165,000. On a roll call vote of 207 to 84, the house approved a \$20,750,000 addition to its original \$109,000,000 for rivers and harbors, a figure the senate had insisted by \$58,000,000. If the senate approves the house action, it will allow the Sarda project in Mississippi and the Conchas project in New Mexico, and authorize maintenance expenditures on Bellington harbor, Washington. For purely military purposes, the bill carried \$333,194,859. It included \$8,500,000 for seacoast defense in the west coast, Panama and Hawaii.

AZALEA-WOLF CREEK JOB WILL BE LET

Improvement of 16 miles of the Pacific highway between Azalea and Wolf Creek summit in Douglas county is to be contracted by the state highway commission at its May 22 meeting. It was announced at Portland today. The contract will call for grading and resurfacing and furnishing crushed rock for stock piles. The contract will be included in the list of the state-financed road projects under the 1935 allocation of \$1,500,000. Twelve jobs are to be of which seven will be paid from state funds and five from federal appropriations.

ENGINE EXPLOSION KILLS THREE MEN

BATAVIA, N. Y., May 7 — (AP) — A locomotive exploded on the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad south of here today and three men were killed. Station Master Bert Coulter of North Alexander said the bodies of the engineer, the fireman and the head trainman had been found, all "pretty badly mangled." The division superintendent's office in Buffalo said they did not know who was killed but that their records showed the engineer was Stephen Hasfurter of Buffalo, with Oscar Arthur of Elmira as fireman and E. P. Arvine of Elmira as head trainman.

The locomotive was hauling freight and ten cars of cattle were derailed. Coulter said cattle were "running all over the countryside."

HUGHES SAYS MORE U. S. JUDGES NEEDED

WASHINGTON, May 7 — (AP) — Additional federal judges to speed the disposition of litigation were recommended by Chief Justice Hughes today in one of his rare speeches. Addressing the American law institute, he said that "where delays are most serious they are due to a failure to provide an adequate supply of judges to attend to the work of the courts." The authorization of additional judges is a congressional function.

COOLIDGE EFFECTS OFFERED AT AUCTION

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., May 7. — (AP) — Household furnishings of the late President Calvin Coolidge were placed on the auction block today. George Bean, auctioneer, to whom Coolidge's widow, Mrs. Grace Goodhue Coolidge, entrusted selling of the household effects, hired the Smith college arena to accommodate an expected crowd of devotees. About 400 articles pointed the trail the 30th president took from a Vermont farm to the White House. For on the block were articles Coolidge used as a student at Amherst college and luxuriously but still sturdy tables and chairs from the now famous two-family house on Massachusetts street where the young lawyer and the attractive school teacher set up housekeeping. Awaiting the bidder, too, were more recent landmarks in the former president's life—books and curios and ornate vases he brought back here with him from the White House, and solid mahogany furniture from his last home, "The Beeches."

Mrs. Coolidge is traveling in Europe now.

MORGAN REWARDED FOR "HUMANITY"

NEW YORK, May 7. — (AP) — For "distinguished services rendered to humanity," J. P. Morgan, the banker, today held a gold medal of the National Institute of Social Sciences. Responding to the presentation last night at the annual dinner of the institute, he said, in one of his infrequent public speeches, that he wondered why he was so honored. "It seems to me that such a simple, plain business life, even though it be a long one, offers but few reasons for such a proceeding. "Thinking it over, I have concluded that any success I have had has come from the fact that, while I know full well that methods must change, the old and well tried principles on which the business with which I am connected was started and carried on, must be held to."

"They may be summed up in a few short phrases: Do your work; be honest; keep your word; help when you can; be fair."

SHOWMAN LOSES ARM AND REPTILES

MONTREAL, May 7. — (AP) — Edward E. Smith, the Louisiana snake raiser who lost his left arm after being bitten by an adder, was in critical condition today and no longer the owner of nine reptiles. Montreal police saw to that yesterday some 15 hours after Smith's hand was amputated in an effort to halt spread of poison through his system. They gassed the snakes and burned them.

For some time, police feared three of Smith's snakes were missing but a search of his room in a midtown theatrical hotel failed to disclose any uncaged reptiles.
