Short took first place in the short put and second in the discus. Nicholson took first in the 220 dash and 2nd in the 100 yard dash. Carter placed second in the high hurdles.

Authorities were reported at Marshal Badoglio's headquarters to be "extremely cordial."

This applied also to natives who showed "welcome for the Italian occupation and its success from footing and killing."

U. S. Legation Aided

Authorities estimated that 500 persons died in the reign of terror which held Addis Ababa from early Saturday, when Emperor Haile Selassie fled into exile, until the fascist forces arrived.

Even until yesterday, the business section and some outlying districts of the town were still partly in the hands of brigands, with the American legation one focal point of attack.

Italian troops, weary after three days of forced marching, which ended their occupation, sent half a company of native troops to the American legation late Tuesday night in time to help beat off the second direct attack in three days on the mission.

Ethiopians said Haile Selassie himself prompted the natives to pillage the city, rather than leave possessions for the Italians.

Reports circulated that King Victor Emmanuel of Italy would soon be named emperor. Ethiopia probably will be declared formally an Italian colony.

SUEZ, Egypt, May 7.—(AP)—A vessel bearing the fugitive Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia and the imperial family into exile at Palestine, arrived today at this city on the southern end of the Suez canal.

At Jerusalem today a representative of the Selassie said the Negus intends to spend only a few days there before proceeding to Europe.

Ethiopian residents here believed the emperor's flight did not mean his abdication from the throne.

They insisted his departure was a strategic move to prevent further military action against his people and to enable him to fight their cause in person before the league of nations at Geneva.

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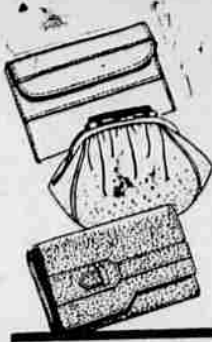
