Vice President Garner a petition opposing increases in armaments. She said it was signed by approximately 1,000,000 persons.

A delegation headed by Miss Martin (D-S. C.), in charge of the \$529,000,000 naval supply bill, to protect passage of the measure.

Relief Funds Voted
The House moved rapidly toward a showdown on the \$1,425,000,000 work relief fund today as it closed over page after page of other ap-

propriations in the \$2,361,000,000 deficiency bill.
Without debate, the next biggest section of the measure providing \$548,531,550 for the social security program in 1937, was approved.
In the same manner the House gave its approval to \$308,000,000 for the civilian conservation corps and \$400,000 for the communication commission's telephone inquiry.

so strong in Roseburg that it is believed the impact was not many miles from the city. From the observations taken it would appear that the meteor either exploded in the air or struck the earth in the vicinity of Mt. Dodson.

Blast Awakens Resident
P. E. Cooper, who resides on the west slope of Mt. Dodson, says he was awakened by a tremendous explosion and blinding glare. He rushed outside the house, he said, and had the "impression of many falling particles." The sound, he reported, "was like a gasoline motor running."

"It seemed to me," he told the News-Review, "there was a rain of little particles, but I didn't see or feel them. I looked up toward the moon and there seemed to be a dust cloud above me."

He believes the meteor exploded before striking the earth. Local observers, many of whom were admittedly frightened, said the meteor was "about half the size of the moon." It gave a brilliant light and left a long plume of smoke, visible for several seconds after the meteor itself had disappeared. While the meteor itself gave off a reddish-yellow light, observers said there was also a peculiar bluish glare which seemed to linger in the sky for a brief period.

Fred Kinsel, local flier, who is a partner with Clarence Dunlap in a plane recently purchased in Salem and flown to Roseburg this week, made an observation flight over the Mt. Dodson region this morning, but failed to find signs of an impact.

ASTRONOMER DOUBTS THAT METEOR FELL NEAR HERE
EUGENE, May 8.—(AP)—J. Hugh Pruett, extension astronomer at the University of Oregon and northwest authority on meteors, expressed doubt today that the blazing meteor witnessed from southern Oregon cities landed in the vicinity of Roseburg.

"The meteor probably appeared to strike the earth nearby, but such is always the case with these large 'shooting stars,' and usually it is found they struck many miles distant," he said. "Reports that the meteor was seen in Washington tend to verify this fact."

Prof. Pruett urged that those

who saw the meteor make reports to him so that he could more definitely locate its course through the heavens. He pointed out it was virtually impossible to tell where the meteors fell till wide spread reports had been received and coordinated.

JOSEPHINE AND KLAMATH FOLKS SEE FIERY VISITOR

GRANTS PASS, May 8.—(AP)—

A blinding glare and dull explosion of a meteor which coursed through the sky this morning was reported here from widely varied points.
John L. Deural at Wolf Creek Airways station said he timed it at 1:35, lasting for 20 seconds. He said its course was from Wolf Creek and that it was traveling low, with intense bluish brilliance outshining three large lights in the station. He reported two dull explosions, smoke and accompanying echoes.

At Camp Wimer, L. C. A. Riniz saw the meteor as a ball of fire. He reported the sound of three explosions about 7 or 8 seconds apart.
Grants Pass residents also saw the meteor.

Those reporting believed the flaming ball fell 15 to 20 miles to the north of their locations, but Douglas said a train conductor at Chehalis, Wash., reported a "burning" plane at that time at Toulon, Wash.

KLAMATH FALLS, May 8.—(AP)—Klamath citizens who stayed out late Thursday night reported seeing a meteor flash through the sky, then fall out of sight behind the mountains to the north-west.

The flash came shortly after 1:30 this morning. Momentarily the heavens were lighted as if by an immense moon.

MEADOW, Ore., May 8.—(AP)—Attendees of the federal weather station here, and night workers reported seeing a meteor blaze its way across the sky at 1:32 this morning.

A garage attendant who saw the heavily winged object said it was followed by the sound of muffled and distant thunder.

ITALY BRINGS ORDER TO ADDIS ABABA

former imperial capital of Ethiopia. The youngsters were encouraged to do so by priests of both the Mussulman and Coptic Christian religions, who promised to aid Italian authorities in bringing peace.

Looting Was Systematic.
As order began to prevail after the rioting and looting which followed Emperor Haile Selassie's flight last Saturday, Italian officers said they found evidence that the pillaging of the capital was carried out systematically.

Natives reported the looters moved from store to store and from house to house under the command of Ethiopian officers, raiding establishments, soaking them with fuel and firing them.

Marshal Badoglio ordered that all natives arrested for rioting, looting, incendiarism and crimes against persons or property be turned over to newly-created courts martial for trial.

The imperial library, ministerial quarters and other buildings adjoining the imperial palace were burned to the ground.

Among the foreign missions, the Turkish legation suffered most, being sacked and burned. The Turkish minister escaped with his life, but his sister was missing and two servants dead.

ITALIANS CAPTURE HARAR, BLACK REMNANTS GIVE UP
ROME, May 8.—(AP)—The capture by Italian troops of Harar, second city of Ethiopia, was reported today by the Mogadiscio correspondent of the newspaper Il Tevere.

The correspondent said the forces of General Rodolfo Graziani moved into Harar yesterday, occupying the final military objective of Italy's campaign in East Africa.

(From Djibouti, French Somaliland, came reports that a large part of Harar was destroyed by fire and looting as the Italian troops approached the city.)

Il Tevere's dispatch said the chief and leading priests of the pontifical welcomed the Italian troops.

Along the road from Jijiga to Harar, remnants of Ras Nasibu's army surrendered their arms.

Ras Seyoum, who fought the Italians more bitterly perhaps than any other Ethiopian chieftain, made his submission today, a Stefani (Italian) News Agency dispatch from Asmara, Eritrea, reported.

LONDON, May 8.—(AP)—The sold crown of Emperor Haile Selassie lay safely hidden in the dim vaults of a London bank.

The crown and other imperial insignia of the Ethiopian hegus were brought secretly to London when the Italian advance began to threaten Addis Ababa, it was disclosed.

Tremendously heavy, the crown is bejeweled and is surmounted by a large cross.

In coming out of this depression as you have a reasonable right to expect?"

Asked how he thought confidence could be restored, the Kansas executive replied "... I believe that a presidential campaign can be made a great means of public education. One that will inform the public and give the people a chance to study and understand what the real issues are."

"You must realize that for three and one-half years, we have had only one side of the story. We've been up against the greatest political propaganda machine that the country has ever seen. And the worst of it is, it is being paid for out of the public treasury."

Kaltenborn guided the conversation into prohibition, social security and foreign affairs.

In his first declaration of the war question since becoming widely discussed as a presidential possibility, Landon said he accepted the "verdict that the question should be returned to the various states for such decision as their citizenry wished. I accept that verdict."

On foreign affairs Landon observed: "It might repay us all to read Washington's farewell address again. I wouldn't say for a moment that we should slavishly follow Washington, or anyone else. But I do say that if we go forward in his spirit we shall meet our obligations to America and the world."

For Social Security
The governor said he was "for" social security, believing "we have reached a stage where government must take a hand... the complicated legislation (the present administration) rushed through in characteristic fashion will, I fear, prove to be unworkable in many respects."

In discussing relief, Landon deplored, "the way in which it has been made a matter of wretched party politics," and said "I, for one, am dedicated to the proposition that henceforth no American citizen shall ever again be put in a position where he has to sell his vote for bread."
