MISS VIVIAN MALONE

Of especial interest to all music lovers of the community is the announcement that Miss Vivian Malone, violinist, will be the soloist at the spring concert of the Roseburg Junior-Sixty Club, Thursday evening, May 14.

Miss Malone studied with Rex Underwood at the University of Oregon for five years. During her entire university course she was an honor scholar student, maintaining as well as a prominent place in the musical activities of the university and city. She played as soloist with the university orchestra, was associate director of the Eugene Junior-Sixty orchestra, and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, national music and drama fraternities, and Phi Lambda Theta, educational honorary society.

Among her numbers in the coming concert, Miss Malone will include the Violin Concerto by Mendelssohn. This composition is one of the great pieces of violin literature, and is often referred to as the perfect violin concerto. Pleasing to the soloist and the audience alike, it is replete with flowing melody and brilliant graceful technical passages which will linger in the memory of the listener long after the number is over.

Speaking of the talent of Miss Malone, the Morning Oregonian stated that "she presented a wide variety of programs revealing mastery of her subject material and of the technique of her instrument." The Oregon Journal commented: "She established herself as a vigorous, fiery violinist with considerable technique and expressive tone."
