

ROOSEVELT GIVES RED CROSS PRIZES

Admiral Grayson Tells of
Aid Given Tornado and
Flood Victims.

CHICAGO, May 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt likened the American Red Cross to the federal government in a letter read today at the organization's national convention.

"Perhaps one reason for the support, the respect, yes, even the love which our Red Cross inspires in all of us is that it is so typically democratic," the president said.

"Like the government itself, you maintain national headquarters in Washington. Like the government, your organization is composed of the rank and file of the people in every county of every state and territory in the union. And, like the government, you exist only to serve to the best of your ability the people who created you."

"The president is also president of the Red Cross."

Major Task Cited

Admiral Cary T. Grayson, chairman of the Red Cross, said the organization's greatest problem this spring was the floods and tornadoes.

He summarized the loss of those masters as affecting 20 states, damaging the property of 649,000 persons, including 4,500 homes destroyed or seriously damaged by tornadoes. More than 500 deaths were reported and more than 2,000 persons injured, he said, and floods sent 140,000 families from their homes.

Red Cross organizers announced that rapid expansion of volunteer personnel to give emergency first aid in motor accident cases was figured a major project. Admiral Grayson pointed to more than 36,000 killed and 105,000 maimed in the United States in 1935 as the motivating force.

Already the Red Cross has placed 1,000 emergency stations, manned by volunteers, in operation along dangerous sections of roads and has designated a total of 3,000 stations for establishment in 30 states.

Will Play Famous Concerto On Violin



The famous concerto in E minor, by Felix Mendelssohn, will be played by Miss Vivian Malone, above, soloist at the concert of the Roseburg Men's Glee club, Thursday night. The only violin concerto Mendelssohn ever wrote, this is probably the most popular composition in all violin literature. Its freshness and lyrical charm make it peculiarly adapted for the spring of the year.

Like all of Mendelssohn's music, his violin concerto in E minor is completely fairy-like and ethereal. The audience movement is often called the feminine part of the composition because of its sweetness and tranquility. It flows along smoothly in the manner of a song without words. The second, or allegro ma non troppo, movement is transitional, and serves as a sort of declaration, introducing the sparkling last movement. The finale sails rapidly from one graceful bit of technical fireworks into another at a fast but steady tempo.

Concerning this last movement, Fritz Kreisler, famous violinist, has said, "How vital and vigorous an instrument the violin can be is shown in the last movement alone, which runs the whole gamut of human emotions."

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WINTER WHEAT TO EXCEED 1935 CROP

WASHINGTON, May 11.—(AP)—A winter wheat crop of 463,708,000 bushels, considerably above the 1935 production, but far below the average from 1928 to 1933, was forecast today by the agriculture department.

The crop reporting board said crop prospects declined during April chiefly as a result of unevenly distributed rainfall and extreme temperatures. Continuation of the drought in the southwest last month, the board said, was largely responsible for a decrease of six per cent in the board's forecast of winter wheat production.

While dry weather damaged crops in the southwest, the board said excessive rains in early April over large areas of the southeast decreased prospects for the winter crops of that area. The spring was reported late over the whole country east of the Rocky mountains, throwing farmers behind with plowing and planting.

Since the first of May, the board said, there has been "a very marked improvement" in conditions chiefly as a result of warmer weather with widespread rains over most of the great plains area where they were most urgently needed.

However, from western Kansas to the Rio Grande river, a large acreage of grain planted last fall already had been lost. Recent rains will permit the planting of spring-sown crops in most of this area, but the board reported a scanty supply of moisture in the subsoil and said the final outcome of crops will depend largely upon the receipt of well distributed rains during the remainder of the growing season.

"Although Senator McNary has been urged by many friends throughout the state to return to Oregon and participate in the campaign, he has preferred to remain at his post of duty at Washington and leave his candidacy for re-election in the hands of the people of Oregon, whom he has served so faithfully and effectively in the senate for nineteen years," Mr. Moores said in making the announcement.

"At the solicitation of his many friends, Senator McNary has, however, consented to participate in the campaign to the extent of delivering this single radio address," Mr. Moores explained.

FARLEY'S CLAIM COVERS 48 STATES

CHICAGO, May 12.—(AP)—Postmaster General James A. Farley paused between trains in Chicago long enough to predict that all 48 states were "Roosevelt territory" despite republican claims.

He was en route to Devils Lake, N. D., to speak before the democratic state convention tonight.

Farley said he didn't consider California's republican vote last Tuesday a source of worry for the democrats, explaining:

"We carried the state by 500,000 in 1932, when we didn't outnumber the republicans in the registration. This year we do."

Writing a democratic platform for 1936 was an item Farley said he wasn't worried about.

He said he "had an idea" that republican charges of promise-breaking should be met with this argument:

"President Roosevelt went into office nine months after the platform was written. In that time, completely new conditions arose. What was he supposed to do, call a new convention and ask for a new platform?"
