Indians Enjoy Role as Movie Actors in Film Depicting Massacre of Palefaces

GALLUP, N. M., May 12.—(AP)—Two hundred and fifty Indians "had the time of their lives" acting the parts of bloodthirsty red men in the filming of a motion picture near here.

"And they were mighty good actors, too," said King Vidor, the director.

Through the cooperation of the U. S. Indian service, the 250 Zunis and Navajos were allowed to hire out to a big Hollywood company at the rate of \$4 a day for each man and his horse. The company fed the horses.

"I never saw a bunch of extras get more fun out of making a picture," said Vidor. "They had the time of their lives."

"Yeh," chimed in Jack Oakie, who, with Jean Parker and Fred MacMurray, heads the cast, "and I bet the horses did too. The way these guys went after their oats, it must have been the first time they ever had a full meal."

The battle scenes, particularly those in which numerous whites were massacred, intrigued the Indians most, the director related. "They couldn't get enough of it. Every day they would hide in their mocassins about half the black cartridges we gave them, and then they would go up in the hills and have a sham battle of

their own. "You should have seen one of those boys jump when another Indian would come up behind and shoot him in the pants. That powder really burns."

But one Zuni wasn't satisfied. His heart was not in his work. One day he rode disconsolately up to the director's tent.

"Me quitting," he said, with perfect finality. "Me tired of playing Indian."

BROWNING, Mont., May 11.—(AP)—"Skunk wagons" are starting to cover the hillside, driven by Blackfoot Indians who have purchased the loud-colored, dilapidated automobiles with money received for land leased to the government for stockmen.

But the "skunk wagons" won't be around for long, in the belief of Fred Gerard, a Blackfoot serving on the Glacier county board of commissioners.

"A parade of cars has been shimmering out of Browning ever since the payments started arriving," Gerard said. "In a few days, the countryside will look like the days of 1883, with skeletons of old cars in place of the bleached bones of the buffalo."

TO PRESERVE TIMBER BORDERING HIGHWAY

PORTLAND, Ore., May 11.—(AP)—Ormond R. Dean, chairman of the state planning commission, said today the group has launched a new study designed to preserve, wherever possible, timber bordering all highways in Oregon.

C. J. Buck, regional forester, is to conduct the investigation for the purpose of recommending legislation for roadside timber protection.

Committees of the planning group, the U. S. forest service, the bureau of public works and WPA workers will aid.

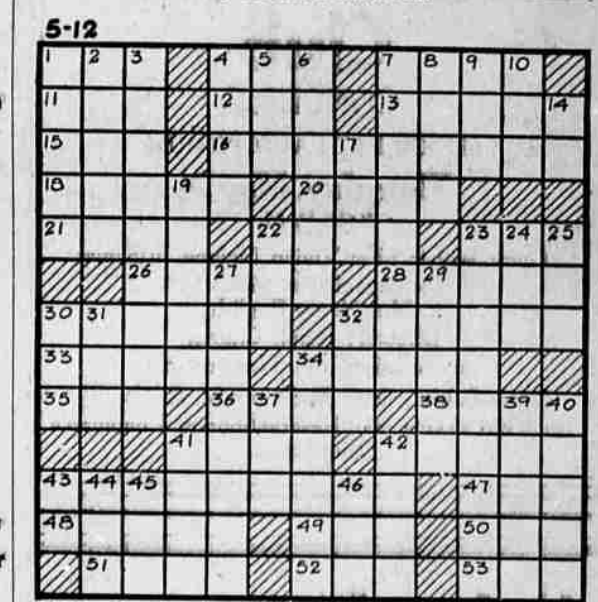

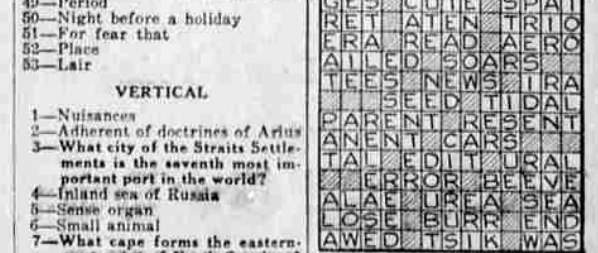
