## NEGRO ASKS SHARE OF BRUNO REWARD

TRENTON, N. J., May 12—(AP)—William Allen, the negro who four years ago today discovered the body of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., is actively seeking at least a portion of the \$25,000 reward offered by New Jersey.

Allen said a few weeks ago he had an interview with Governor Hoffman.

The governor told him, he said, that he wasn't much in the picture, but he pointed out that if he hadn't found the baby's body on Mt. Rose hill, two miles from the Lindbergh home, Bruno Richard Hauptmann could not have been executed.

Allen was given a job at a state institution soon after his discovery but later lost it. Now he is back at his old job and happy to get it. His chances to get a portion of the reward will be decided by New Jersey's chancery court, which was asked to settle the claims by New York and New Jersey police.

Others claiming it are William R. Stroug, New York bank teller; Walter V. Lyle, New York gas station manager; and John Lyons, Lyle's assistant.

Hauptmann was arrested after he gave a ransom bill to Lyle who noted Hauptmann's license number. The bank teller identified the bill as ransom money.

## NEW TAX SCHEDULE OFFERED SENATE

WASHINGTON, May 12—(AP)—Here is the new tax schedule submitted by the treasury to the senate finance committee:

"(b) Rate of tax in general—there shall be levied, collected, and paid for each taxable year upon the adjusted net income of every corporation a tax equal to the sum of the following:

"Two-sevenths of the amount of the undistributed net income which does not exceed 14 per centum of the adjusted net income;

"One-third of the amount by which the undistributed net income exceeds 14 per centum and does not exceed 25 per centum of the adjusted net income;

"Three-eighths of the amount by which the undistributed net income exceeds 25 per centum and does not exceed 45 per centum of the adjusted net income; and

"One-half of the amount by which the undistributed net income exceeds 45 per centum of the adjusted net income."

The treasury also suggested informally a \$1,000 exemption for corporations with income up to \$20,000.

## AGRICULTURE NOT IN JOBLESS INSURANCE

SALEM, May 12—(AP)—All persons employed in cooperative associations for the growing, harvesting and packing agricultural products, including fruits and nuts, are exempt under the unemployment insurance provisions as "agricultural labor," Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle ruled today.

The definition of agricultural labor was requested by the state unemployment commission, because farm labor was not included in provisions of the act.

The opinion held further that when farm products are no longer in the possession of the individual growers but are turned over to another person or corporation, or to a cooperative association for grading, packing and marketing, labor employed would come under provisions of the act.

The attorney general also held that while non-profit cooperative associations may be composed solely of growers of agricultural products, organized for the sole purpose of grading and marketing, they are separate and distinct entities and labor employed by them would not be exempt under the farm labor provisions.

Van Winkle stated his interpretation concurred with the federal social security act.
