

DUROCHER, STENDEL STAGE FIST FIGHT

Another Chapter Added to Individual Feud Record of Major Leagues.

NEW YORK, May 13.—(AP)—Obviously jealous of its reputation as baseball's rough-house league, the National today held an advantage of two downright brawls and two bitter quarrels to one minor disagreement for the American.

The Casey Stengel-Leo Durocher battle of yesterday was the nation's latest sideshow and gave every indication that the remaining two games of the series between the Dodgers and the Cardinals might even add to the National league's advantage.

Durocher was nursing a split lip today while Flatbush bowled the praises of his warrior manager, Casey Stengel. Casey was saying very little about the brawl under the stands yesterday, however.

He did say that Leo was mistaken in thinking that he was hit by a bat. "I was a right, just a plain right," Casey insisted. Flatbush, storm center of the league, has already called out special police to keep the peace this season. This was necessitated by the fight between Van Lingle Mungo, the Brooklyn pitcher, and Dick Bartell, Giants' shortstop. The first took place at the Polo grounds but the teams shortly moved over to Flatbush, where they insist on their prerogative of nursing old feuds.

Other Feuds Hang On There was every indication also that the old winter squabble between Virgil Davis, the Cards' catcher, and the eminent Dizzy Dean has not been eliminated as the principals both insist.

Davis, admittedly one of the finest catchers in the league, was not behind the bat yesterday when the Cards opened the campaign in the east. Instead, a rookie, Ogdowski, caught Dean, and there are some who believe that even Dizzy needs the help of a good experienced catcher.

The other feud in the National involves Paul Derringer, ace Cincinnati pitcher, and Larry MacPhail, the fiery general manager of the Reds. Originally it was announced that Derringer had been indefinitely suspended by Charley Dressen, manager of the Reds, for failing to slide into home.

UNDERDOGS ENJOY NIGHT OF VICTORY

Angels Down Sactos, Reds Trim Seattle, Padres Beat Portland.

(By the Associated Press.) The first perfect underdog's day of the season tightened up the Pacific coast league baseball race today.

Leiber of the lowly Angels pulled down the curtain on the underdog's holiday last night by handing the not-quite-so-lowly Sacramento Senators their first shutout 4-0. Leiber allowed only four hits. Messer, Los Angeles third baseman, illustrated the evils of chewing tobacco and gave Russell an opportunity to get into the lineup and hit a home run. Messer swallowed his cud, and was taken to the hospital.

In the other night game Nicholson helped the slipping Mission Reds down the second place Seattle club 8-1 by keeping the Indians' hits well scattered and bunting out a double and a single to drive in two Red runs.

Portland's Beavers lost their first game under their new player-manager, Bill Sweney, when San Diego put on a ninth inning rally to win 4-5.

Ludolph lost his first game of the season when the San Francisco Seals drove him to the showers with a 4-run ninth inning rally which cost the pace-setting Oakland ball club the game 9-7.

CORNELL NAMED UO ATHLETIC MANAGER

EUGENE, May 12.—(AP)—A former University of Oregon football and baseball star, Anson Black Cornell, came back to his alma mater today as athletic manager under the new revision of athletic management at the University.

Cornell, who performed for the Webfoot on football teams from 1912 to 1915 under Hugo Bezdek, has been director of athletics at Pacific University. His appointment to the post here was made by President C. V. Boyer after a meeting of the new ten-man athletic control board.

Cornell will leave his position at Forest Grove on July 1 to report here. After graduation, Cornell spent 17 years as coach at the College of Idaho, Caldwell, and followed with the position at Pacific University. His duties here will be concerned solely with inter-collegiate athletics and a manager for all other extracurricular activities will be chosen later. Cornell's salary will be \$3,000.

Under the former organization, Hugh E. Rowson was graduate manager with N. Thomas Stoddard in charge of athletics and Ralph S. Schump in charge of other activities. All resigned.

TOWNSEND FAVORS CLERIC PRESIDENT

LOS ANGELES, May 12.—(AP) Dr. Francis E. Townsend, old age pension champion, suggested to American voters today that they elect a clergyman to the presidency this fall.

"It is high time to abandon the idea that legislation can emanate only from those trained in the law," the gray-haired physician told a meeting of 8,000 followers.

"Those who make laws are in many instances unfit to formulate them. There are many men of the cloth who are good business men. Why not this fall elect some eminent divine as president of the United States?"

Dr. Townsend's suggestion followed a recent statement that he has 615,000,000 acres of forest lands in continental United States, which is about one-third of the land area of the country.

YANKEES BLANKED BY LOWLY BROWNS

Detroit Defeats Boston in Another Shut-Out; Cards Lose Behind Dizzy.

By ANDY CLARKE (Associated Press Sports Writer.) The New York Yankees, leading the American league race, are wondering whether the St. Louis Browns again are going to throw a monkey wrench into the machinery.

The Browns were the bane of the Yankees last year, turning very savage when the McCarthymen were in the opposite dugout and then becoming just as docile when the Tigers happened to be the foe.

The Browns, with 13 straight defeats behind them, picked on the Yankees yesterday to break their losing streak, with a 7-0 shutout. The Red Sox also were shut out, 4-0, by the Tigers.

For the second day in a row, the Giants won a ball game in the ninth inning; Travis Jackson hitting a clean single to score Mel Ott for a 5-4 win. Ott, the home run hero of Monday's game, singled and stole second to lay the groundwork for Jackson's winning poke.

Castelman and Lieber each hit a homer with one on for the Giants. The Cincinnati Reds sent the Phillies into the National league cellar when they beat them 6-4.

Riggs, Reds third sacker, sent home the winning runs as he singled with the bases loaded and two out in the seventh.

Rain Halts 3 Games. Darkness and an approaching thunder storm halted the Bees-Pirates game with the score 6-11 in the tenth inning. It was a free-hitting contest in which 24 hits were made off seven pitchers, four of whom worked for the Bees.

Two other games were called on account of rain. Washington held a 3-0 lead over the White Sox when the rain came down in the third inning.
