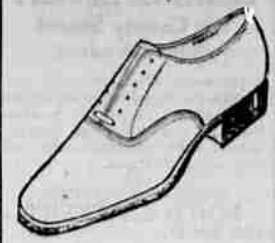

"SOCIALISM" ROW HITS UNIVERSITY

POCATELLO, Idaho, May 13.—(AP)—A campus row which flared amid charges of "socialism" terminated today in the dismissal of two members of the publications committee at Idaho Southern University on charges of "inefficiency."

Owen Stratton of Salmon, son of a state senator, and Robert Coleman of Burley, were removed. A third member of the committee, Hayden Stites of Blaine, Mont., resigned two weeks ago.

"If I hadn't they'd have got me too," he said today.

The student council voted the dismissals by a count of eight to one. The council president, Sherman Love of Grace, presided. Undergraduates acted as "lawyers" on both sides.

The group informed Governor Charles Martin the transfer of the set, which was purchased through donations by school children, would be "a breach of faith."

MAHAN'S RANSOM BOOTY RECOVERED

WASHINGTON, May 14.—J. Edgar Hoover announced today that \$15,374.47 of Weyerhaeuser ransom money, or money taken in exchange for the "hot" money has been recovered since the arrest of William Mahan in San Francisco last week.

The director of the bureau of investigation said \$157,319.47 of the \$200,000 ransom paid for the return of nine-year-old George Weyerhaeuser has been "actually recovered up to the present time."

Hoover said special agents located \$14,000 in a glass jar hidden approximately 27 miles west of Battle Mountain, Nevada. The jar contained \$13,000 in \$100 bills and \$1,000 in \$50 bills, "which had been obtained by Mahan through exchange of the actual ransom currency." The money had been buried in the ground, Hoover said. The bills were placed inside the glass jar, which was in turn "telescoped" in three successive tins.

Currency totaling \$37,374.47, recovered from Mahan and from his automobile after his arrest, was described as all "either actual ran-

som money or money obtained by him in exchange for ransom money."

Two sisters separated for 52 years were reunited when Mrs. Minnie Angal of Grand Rapids, Mich., visited Mrs. May Peterson at Watsonville, Calif. Orphaned when children, they were adopted by different families and had not seen each other since.
