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American Legion Auxiliary Activities

 Our Motto: We honor the dead by serving the living.
 Poppy day, to be observed in Roseburg and throughout the United States on next Friday and Saturday, May 22 and 23, has become one of the most significant days on the American calendar. On that day each year millions of Americans wear little red poppies in honor of the World War dead and contribute toward the welfare of the war's living victims, the disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead. Behind the observance of the day has been developed a poppy manufacturing industry which gives employment to many hundreds of disabled veterans in sixty different poppy making centers.

59,000 Poppies Made at Roseburg Facility

Under the leadership of Mrs. Irving Reigal, department hospital chairman, 59,000 poppies have been made at the local veterans' facility. Ninety men are engaged in this work, receiving 1 cent for each poppy made. Most of the men chosen for this employment received their compensation directly from the government and the large majority selected have dependents. Veterans are anxious to make these poppies. Not only does it give them the joy of having a little spending money but a general lift in morale is noted almost from the beginning of the compensation process. "In idleness there is perpetual despair." The Roseburg facility is providing poppies for 62 units in the state, the Portland hospital only caring for the needs of Portland and the immediate vicinity.

Mrs. Oscar Worthwhile Lauds

"These are the finest and most perfectly made poppies I have ever inspected," exclaimed Mrs. Oscar Worthwhile, wife of the American Legion national vice president, who visited the facility here a few weeks ago. And indeed they are, for Mrs. Reigal, with the cooperation of the men engaged in poppy making has been satisfied with nothing but the best in workmanship.

How Poppy Became Memorial Flower

The idea of the poppy as a memorial flower for the World War dead sprang up following the war as naturally as the little wild flower itself grows in the fields of France and Belgium. The poppy was the one touch of beauty which survived the devastated battle areas. It bloomed along the edge of the trenches, beneath the tangled barbed wire, about the gaping shell holes and among the high graves. The soldiers of all nations came to look upon it as the living symbol of the sacrifices of their dead comrades. When the women of the auxiliary ask you to buy a poppy, do not refuse — they do not ask for themselves but for those poor victims of the war which was to end war.
