PRUNE BIDS ASKED BY FEDERAL GOVT.

SALEM, May 18.—(AP)—Invitations for bids have been sent out to Oregon, Washington and Idaho bidders for supplying 1,500 tons of dried prunes to the federal government, Governor Martin was advised today.

The call for western prunes was the result of recent letters sent the government by Martin urging use of some of the surplus prunes in this state. Oregon has between 8,000 and 10,000 tons of prunes on hand, the state department of agriculture reported.

Bids will be opened May 26 at Washington and delivery will be made 30 days after bids are opened. Shipments will be handled by H. A. Palen of the federal government at San Francisco.
