OREGON'S TRAFFIC
SURVEY LAUNCHED

SALEM, May 19.—(AP)—A state-wide traffic survey, to determine the relative travel on Oregon highways, was launched today under the direction of the works progress administration.

The cost of the survey in Oregon was estimated at \$250,000 and virtually a year will be required to complete the job. Similar surveys were to be conducted in all other states receiving federal highway aid.

The survey will be used as a basis for allocating both federal and state funds for highway improvement.

Officials here said several crews would be in the field within a short time and that the survey would be pushed as rapidly as possible.

HITLER'S TRUSTED
SERVITOR PASSES

MUNICH, Germany, May 19.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler, white and visibly shaken, today buried the only man he trusted to drive his motor car—Julius Schreck.

He buried him without preacher or prayer, in the custom of the blackshirt Schutz Staffel, the select formation which guards der fuhrer's life with its own.

Schreck, who fought shoulder to shoulder with Hitler in the Munich beer cellar patch more than a decade ago, went to prison with him and then became his chauffeur. He died Saturday at the age of 55.

There were some 7,000 uniformed men in the guard of honor, from all party formations, which stood at stiff attention in the cemetery. A speech replaced a sermon. The Schutz Staffel some of allegiance to their leader. "When Everyone Else Becomes Disloyal," was sung instead of a psalm.
