

ROSEBURG CRATE GETS LEGAL O. K.

SALEM, May 21—(AP)—Denying any proposed changes in fruit and vegetable crate specifications would destroy the crating standards, Frank McKennon of the Oregon department of agriculture, said today strict adherence to the statute prohibiting any deceptive packages, the basis of the standard, would be provided.

McKennon stated the agriculture department would recommend some alterations, but stated the reports the standard would be destroyed were "absolutely false." He was completing his recommendations for some changes, he said, as well as completing his changes in grading of vegetables.

Changes to be recommended in crating, the official disclosed, would legalize the Roseburg cauliflower crates over which there was a temporary controversy last fall. Alterations for various fruit boxes would be permitted only as experimental for one season only. These packages, however, would not permit deception but would make fruit more attractive for sale, he declared.

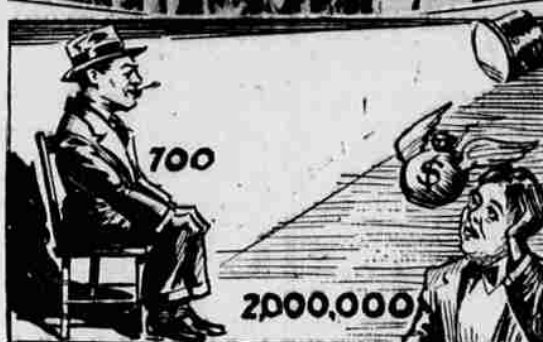
ELKTON

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FARLEY RAPPED BY BACKER OF LONDON

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—Replying to criticism by Democratic Chairman James A. Farley of Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas, Representative Lambertson (R-Kan.) said today "Jim Farley is scared before the race begins."

In a formal statement, Lambertson said: "He (Farley) complains about our governor's inexperience and the fact that he hasn't been known much over a year. Nobody ever heard of Jim's statesmanship before he came to Washington. A few had heard of his being a boxing commissioner, and when this big Tammanyite talks about a perilous experiment, should Landon be successful, it's enough to make the country laugh out loud."

Farley, postmaster general and chairman of the democratic national committee, in a speech before the Michigan convention at Grand Rapids yesterday, did not mention Landon's name, but referred to him as a republican governor of "a typical prairie state."

Lambertson said Farley "tries to belittle Landon because he is from a prairie state, indicating that he looks with disdain upon anything that might come out of the Mississippi valley."

"The only time we ever elect a democratic president is when the republicans are divided," Lambertson added. "It was the republican votes that elected F. D. R. Landon is a harmonizer. He will solidify the republican party again, and that is all we need, but along with it we are going to get a lot of democrats who believe in some old pioneer principles."

OREGON FARMERS' UNION ENDS MEET

MT. ANGEL, Ore., May 22—(AP)—The Oregon Farmers' union closed its 1936 convention here Thursday. All 1936 officers were retained with George W. Potts of Jefferson continuing as state president; John Plass of Forest Grove, vice-

president; S. B. Holt, Salem, secretary-treasurer; and J. H. McBea, Dallas, and Henry Thompson, Clatskanie, members of the executive board.

He also praised the setup of the state bank which he declared self-supporting. Ray W. Gill, Oregon state grange master, was an impromptu speaker.

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PORTLAND PONDS QUARANTINE ON DOGS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22—(AP)—City, county and state health officials considered suggestions for a city-wide dog quarantine today. The quarantine was proposed at a session here yesterday.

Dr. E. E. Chase, city veterinarian, said 75 cases of rabies have been reported in Portland since March and that 20 persons had been bitten.

Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, said "persons attribute ignorance of the fact that their dogs are infected will take their pets to the beaches or other resorts and before we know it the epidemic will be state-wide."
