CARDINALS REGAIN NATIONAL LOOP TOP

Detroit Reaches Third in American by Winning 6th Straight Game.

Paint echoes of the thunderous 1934 world series have begun to rumble through the major leagues as the Tigers and Cardinals are showing something like their championship form of two years ago.

The Cards have been running along in front for a couple of weeks but it took a day in second place to make them buckle down to work in dead earnest and wallop the Giants 4 to 2 yesterday to regain the lead. Meanwhile the injury-ridden Detroit team has started the same sort of comeback it made after a poor start last year, turning back the Yankees 16 to 9 and moving into third place with their sixth consecutive victory.

The triumphs of these two old enemies were the high spots of the big league program yesterday, too. Jimmie Fox belted his tenth home run of the season and Johnny Whitehead, the White Sox sophomore, and Harry Keller, the Athletics' freshman, dueled for 14 innings before Keller cracked and the Pirates wound up a six-run ninth inning rally with a homer by Jensen with two aboard to beat the Phillies 7-4.

Perrell Gets Revenge. Perrell, knocked out in two innings Wednesday went right back at the Browns and hurled seven hit ball to win 6-2. Fox's homer, coming with two aboard in the third, gave him invaluable aid. Lanning, up from Knoxville, pitched a four hitter for the other Boston team and came out ahead of the Reds and Stine, 3-2.

Henshaw, the Cub midget, curved the Dodgers into submission with seven hits, winning 4-0. Whitehead, who was even more of a sensation last year than Kelley has been this spring, came close to being the day's hard luck victim. He didn't allow an earned run but his mates made five errors behind him. He finally won out 3-2 in the 14th when Kelley gave three straight walks and then a single to Luke Appling.

The Senators found their experiment of shifting Travis from short to right field a successful one when the youngster contributed a home run in a 7-1 triumph over Cleveland.

WILHELM, BASEBALL VETERAN, PASSES

Wilhelm started in the big leagues with Brooklyn in 1902 and after his retirement from the mound in 1921 managed the Philadelphia Nationals for two years.

SEALS' ERRORS AID PORTLAND TO WIN

Angels Beat Seattle, San Diego and Acorns Take Other Coast Games.

With the aid of four double plays and three Seal errors the Portland Beavers yesterday smothered San Francisco 11-5. Six Beaver runs were unearned as the Seals bled the ball three times. The game tied the two clubs with the Missions for third.

Only one earned run was scored as Thomas of Los Angeles won a 2-1 pitcher's duel from Barrett of Seattle last night. Each also muffed the ball twice to give their opponents a free run. Barrett allowed six hits and one run while Thomas should have a shutout for his five-hit job.

San Diego won the other night game 5-4 from Sacramento in the only game where hits—13 each for each team—accounted for all but one run.

CRITICAL U. C. L. A. EDITOR "DOUSED"

LOS ANGELES, May 22.—(AP)—A feud between the campus newspaper editor and Bruin football players waxed hot today at the University of California at Los Angeles, unquenched by a pail of water.

The water was reported dumped on Gilbert Harrison, editor of the Daily Bruin, by two of the gridiron athletes he had accused in print for not earning their pay as student-janitors.

"About the only thing that most of the football players really do who get 50 cents an hour for going through the motions of keeping Kerkhoff hall clean is to saunter around as anyone might who helps the mortgage on the building," wrote Harrison in an editorial.

"If the associated students has to recruit the kind of men it is recruiting to win games for U. C. L. A. and help pay off the debt, then at least it should see to it that these men are kept isolated in some far off spot and brought out into public only for football practices and final contests."

Retorted George Dickerson, captain of the 1936 Bruin team: "In some universities if such a thing would be printed the editor would fail to show up for work the next morning."

"It is always too bad that the good guys who play football because they like the game should have to share the reputation of punch-drunk and pugnaeous companions."
