WANDA ARMOUR'S NIECE IS AWARDED HIGH HONOR IN LITERARY WORLD

Of much interest here is the awarding of the Newburg medal which is one of the most coveted awards in the literary world, to Carol Ryrle Brink, noted writer of Minneapolis and New York, who is a niece of Wanda Armour, of Roseburg, and a granddaughter of the latter's mother, Mrs. Caroline A. Watkins, 2401 Main street, in Vancouver, Wn. Mrs. Watkins is very well known in Roseburg, having made her home here for several years with her daughter, Wanda Armour, before going to Vancouver to visit.

Carol Ryrle Brink is the author of several books and the book on which she received the Newburg medal award was "Caddy Woodlawn," the true story of the life of her grandmother, Mrs. Watkins. A very short time ago a national broadcast from coast to coast program was given in honor of Mrs. Watkins, who is the original "Caddy" of "Caddy Woodlawn." Mrs. Watkins was interviewed via the national broadcast from Richmond, Va. She read the dedication of the book which has been awarded the Newburg medal for this year. "To Gram—whose tales of her childhood in Wisconsin gave a lonely little girl many happy hours." The written dedication on the flyleaf of Mrs. Watkins' copy of the book reads: "For the original 'Caddy' who is also the best of grams from Carol Ryrle Brink."

The book of "Caddy Woodlawn" was inspired by tales told by Mrs. Watkins to her granddaughter whom she cared for for fourteen years. On rainy afternoons "Caddy" took the small Carol Ryrle Brink on her knee and related tales of Civil war days spent in Engalla, Wisconsin.

Seven thousand five hundred copies of the book have been printed and 10,000 more will soon be off the press, so great is the demand for the charming story of the lovely tomboy "Caddy" who is now the white haired "Gram" who spends her time visiting her two daughters, Wanda Armour, in Roseburg, and Mrs. Robert H. Phil in Vancouver, Wn.

The original manuscript of the story was presented "Caddy" by her author granddaughter and the first copy released was autographed and sent to the "story grandmother."

The book is reported by critics to be beautifully written and because of the historic value, the state of Wisconsin placed it in every public library throughout the state. The book, woven around a most appealing home story, realistically tells of Indian John and days of massacre in Wisconsin.

Wanda Armour has ordered a copy for each library in Roseburg and expects the books to arrive here within the next week. Book lovers of Roseburg are anxiously awaiting the arrival of the copies.
