CONVENTION TRAIN DUE IN ROSEBURG

Residents of Roseburg and vicinity will have an opportunity Thursday, May 28, to see one of the new type of streamlined trains, when the Rexall convention hotel-on-wheels stops in this city briefly.

Designed primarily as a convention place for the 10,000 Rexall druggists throughout the United States, the million dollar streamlined train has been taken over by the public and the company executives have been forced to modify their original plan of operation.

It had been planned to use the train as a meeting place for 109 district conventions. Instead of the usual 30 or more hotel meetings, the plan being to take the convention to delegates instead of making the delegates go to conventions.

Public interest, however, was so great, that thousands of people demanded the right to inspect the equipment and it was necessary to modify the convention plans and put the train on a combined convention junket and inspection tour.

The train, built specially for the United Drug company, is composed of 12 streamlined cars, including four exhibit cars, two lecture cars, a cafeteria diner, two

cars for dancing and sleeping cars for the permanent staff and crew of 50 that travels with the train. It is air-conditioned throughout and will be hauled the entire trip by the huge 350-ton streamlined, oil-burning locomotive built for the company by the New York Central railroad.

The exact time for the arrival of the train here has not been fixed, but will be announced the first of the week by Nathan Fullerton, Roseburg Rexall druggist.

432 AMERICANS WIN SWEEPSTAKES COIN

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, May 23.—(AP)—Americans again today reaped a harvest in winning tickets in the first day's drawing of the 18th Irish hospital sweepstakes. A total of 432 American names—almost 44 per cent of the total of 984 drawn—came out of the drum.

Each ticket carries a value of at least \$2.25 and a few of them have an additional chance to win thousands of dollars more since 32 Americans won tickets on the five hot favorites racing in the famous English derby at Epsom Downs next Wednesday.

Ten residual prizes, each valued at \$5,337, and 1,200 consolation prizes of \$500 each will be drawn Monday when the drums of fortune spin again.

Six Americans—four from New York, one from Pittsburgh, and one from Massachusetts—drew tickets on Payup, the fifth and last favorite.
