EXPERT ANGLER TO SHOW SKILL HERE

Roy L. "Doc" Haslett, "The Gypsy Angler," who visited Roseburg about a year ago, returned to the city today, and is to conduct a casting demonstration and school of angling at the courthouse lawn between 1 a. m. and 3 p. m. Tuesday.

At 7 o'clock this evening, he will present a program of special interest to anglers over Radio Station KRNR.

"Doc" is employed by four leading tackle manufacturers of the country to travel up and down the Pacific coast to give freely of his services in an effort to make anglers out of "dub" fishermen. He contends that proper tackle and a knowledge of its correct use adds greatly to the pleasure of a fishing trip.

When he was here last year he attracted much attention by his unerring ability to do things with the fly and bait casting rods that many local anglers thought impossible.

Anglers are invited to bring their net outfits for inspection and use. Haslett says, although there will be plenty of equipment furnished free for everyone's use.

The exhibition and school are absolutely free and nothing is offered for sale. All anglers who desire to improve their ability in fly and bait casting, and who desire any information or advice with regard to tackle are invited by "Doc" Haslett to meet him at the courthouse yard Tuesday at any time between 11 a. m. and 3 p. m.

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HOWARD LYSTUL OF GLENDALE PASSES

Howard Lystul, 51, well known Glendale resident, died Sunday at the open air sanitarium at Milwaukie, Ore., following a long period of illness.

Mr. Lystul was born in Wisconsin, September 14, 1885, and came to Glendale with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Lystul, in 1905, residing there continuously, except for a brief period of residence in Portland.

For many years he was associated with his father in the lumber business at Glendale, the senior Mr. Lystul having been in partnership with Thomas E. Lawson and J. E. Stuveland in the Lystul-Lawson Lumber company.

He served for a number of years as city treasurer of Glendale and was Glendale's correspondent for the Roseburg News-Review and the Morning Oregonian at Portland until eight months ago, when ill health forced his complete retirement.

He was married June 28, 1924, to Miss Gertrude Nebel, who, with his father, J. O. Lystul, now of Merrill, Wis., survive.

He was a life member of the Lutheran church at Glendale and a member of the Masonic lodge.

Funeral services will be held at the Lystul home at Glendale at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday, with Rev. D. A. Wolf of Wolf Creek officiating. Committal services at the Glendale Masonic cemetery will be in charge of the Masonic lodge. Funeral arrangements are being conducted by R. M. Eberle, associate director of the Douglas Funeral home.

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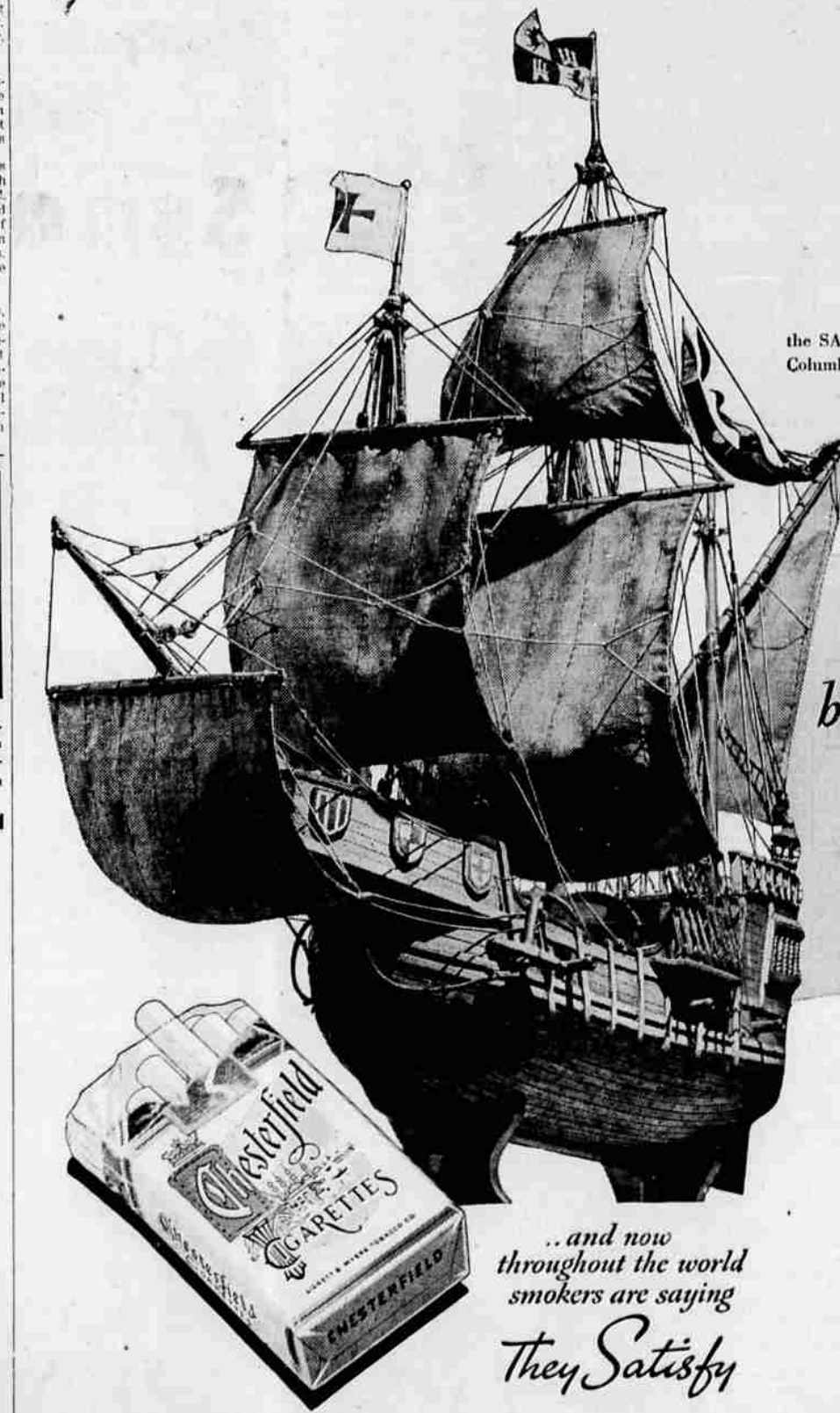
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
