GRANGE VICTORY DRIVE PROGRESSES

A "victory drive" has been inaugurated by the national Grange, expected to reach all its 8,000 subordinates located in 35 different states; designed to give a boost to membership finances and Grange work in general during the period from April 1 to June 30. Spanish-American War Essay Contest
Won by Josephine Wolfe of Sutherlin

Josephine Wolfe, county winner of the grade school essay contest sponsored by the United Spanish War Veterans auxiliary, attends the Sutherlin public school. She is 13 years of age and in the seventh grade.

The auxiliary is sponsoring a nationwide essay contest on the subject, "The Spanish-American War." The Douglas county winning essay will compete in the state contest and the Oregon winner will have a chance to win the national award. The Douglas county winning essay by Josephine Wolfe, which will be entered in the state contest, is printed in full:

THE WAR OF 1898 OR THE SPANISH AMERICAN WAR
JOSEPHINE WOLFE,
Sutherlin, Douglas County, Oregon.
Age 13, 7th grade, Sutherlin public school.

The Spanish-American war was started because of a revolution in Cuba against Spanish rule. Though Spain held many American colonies at the beginning of the nineteenth century, she lost them all, except Cuba and Porto Rico before the century was over.

Cuba tried to throw off Spain by organizing an insurrection in 1895. The Spanish government decided severe measures were necessary and appointed a general-governor, Weyler. He drove the country people into the cities and towns, then burned their homes and destroyed everything which would assist them in any way. His attempt failed; another general was put in his place. The Cuban motto was, "Independence or Death," and at the end of three years Spain was still unsuccessful, and her treatment aroused sympathy of American people, who took up arms in behalf of Cuba.

The "Maine," an American battleship, was sent to Havana to protect American interests. Spain resented this attitude and the "Maine," with her crew, was blown up. It was finally reported the ship was destroyed by a submarine explosion. Other American property in Cuba that was highly valued was destroyed, and people wished to have Cuba annexed to the United States.

President McKinley decided the war must stop, and congress passed resolutions to this effect: first, Cubans were free; second, Spain must give up her authority there; third, United States leave the island under the Cuban control.

War started April 25, the army increased to 62,000 men. There were no drafted men in this war; the soldiers were all volunteers. Dewey sailed to Philippine islands against the Spanish fleet. The Spanish war vessels were destroyed and Manila captured. Only one American vessel was seriously injured.

An American fleet blocked the northern coast while Spain held the Santiago harbor, but as they were blocked there and could not

get out, Shafter led a land army of 1500 men overland and captured the city. In this battle Colonel Roosevelt and his Rough Riders won their fame.

The six vessels of the Spanish fleet were entirely destroyed. The Americans were rapidly gaining control of Cuba, so Spain asked for peace. President McKinley proposed a treaty that held that Spain give up Cuba, cede Porto Rico and Guam to the United States, and cede the Philippine islands to the United States, also for twenty million dollars.

At first it was thought unwise to annex the Philippines to the United States because they were so far away, but the objections gave way as it was thought it would improve the trade with the east.

This war gave us influence in the other countries and increased European trade and respect for the United States.

I believe a few years ago the "Maine" was raised and the remains of the sailors buried here while the ship was dragged out to the sea and sunk again.

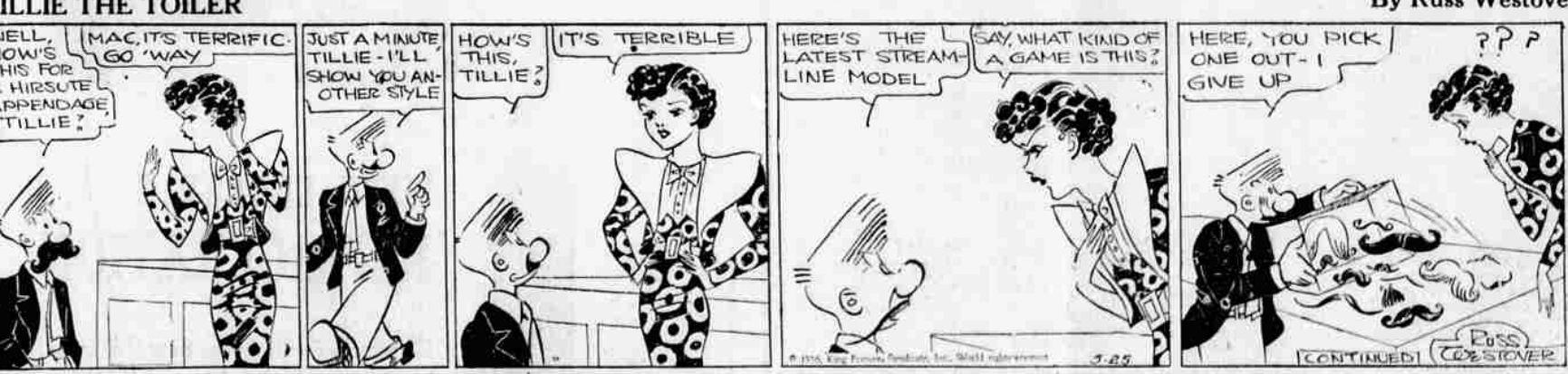

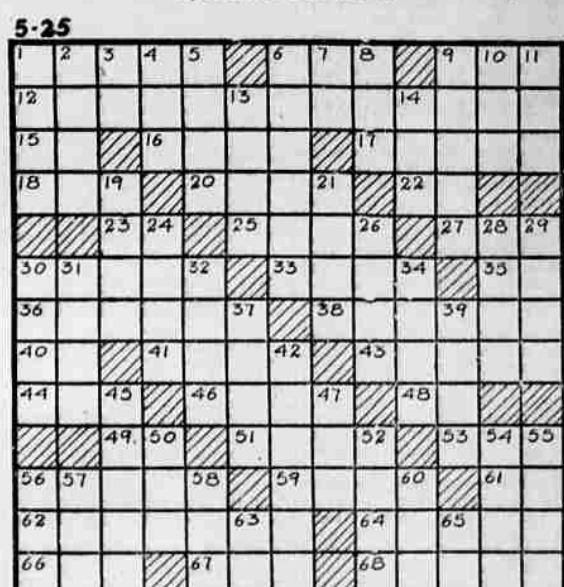
