

SPAN DEDICATION FETE SET AT COOS

NORTH BEND, Ore., May 25.—(Special to the News-Review)—Competition of the rugged coast of Oregon through building of six magnificent bridges and the Oregon Coast highway will be celebrated at North Bend June 5, 6, and 7, when the \$2,600,000 Coos Bay span, largest of the six will be dedicated.

The general committee and its assistants are spending approximately \$15,000 to stage the dedication successfully, having budgeted \$500 in prizes for the June 5 parade, and \$325 in prizes for the June 6 parade, as well as \$900 in prizes for sports events.

Governor Martin of Oregon has consented to crown the queen, who with her court of a crown princess and attendants, will be feted at two dances and two banquets, as well as in the coronation ceremony June 5 at 10 a. m.

The queen and her court will be announced and introduced to the public May 27 in the opening Queen's ball at the North Bend Community hall, staged by the North Bend American Legion post. This dance is the only pre-celebration feature on the schedule, however.

The Pacific Logging congress of Portland is staging its Oregon championship bucking contest at North Bend June 6 at 4 p. m., with the winner and his Biers advancing to the coast and world championship meets at Eureka, Calif., October 7 to 10. J. W. Forrester, at the Coos Bay Lumber company, Marshfield, is handling entries for this event. A first prize of \$35 is offered. Also on the dedication program are boat races, fireworks and wrestling bouts.

BOY EXTORTIONIST RECEIVES PAROLE

ALBANY, May 26.—(AP)—William Cole, 17-year-old student charged with attempting to extort \$20,000 from Mrs. H. N. Cockerline, Albany widow, received a parole to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Cockerline, yesterday after juvenile court had imposed a two-year sentence in the industrial school.

Cole confessed, police said, and blamed his net on ideas he gained from reading detective stories.

In a note, Mrs. Cockerline was warned that her home might be burned and her son slain if she failed to pay the money. No one appeared at a rendezvous to claim a dummy package but Cole's remark to her on a street after sending the note that he understood she had received one resulted in his detention.

The return trip was made down the coast highway, giving some of the young folks their first view of the ocean. The trip will be a thrilling memory for years to come in the minds of the class of 1936.

HIGHWAY SAFETY TALK SCHEDULED

William O'Neill, president of General Tire and Rubber company, will be interviewed in New York on Wednesday evening, May 17, by John H. Kennedy, noted news commentator of the National Broadcasting company, lecturer, and former editor of Colliers.

This interview will be broadcast over a coast-to-coast network of the National Broadcasting company through about a score of the largest radio stations in the country.

Mr. Kennedy will interview Mr. O'Neill, one of the foremost authorities in the country on the question of highway safety, about the importance of greater safety in transportation on the public highways. He will show what is being done by the leading business and industrial concerns of the country in trying to cut down the toll of traffic fatalities.

Mr. O'Neill also will discuss the part that proper automotive equipment plays in making highway travel safer for both motorists and pedestrians.

Under the amendment, a state tax in 1937 could not exceed the 1935 levy by more than six mills on the dollar and a four percent reduction in the limit each year for five years after 1937 would be started.

A petition to qualify for the ballot must carry 10,000 signatures and be completed by July 3.

BURTON LAIRD GETS CHEMISTRY COURSE

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 26.—Burton H. Laird, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Laird of Roseburg, who was one of the 15 young men and women of the state recently selected by the state board of higher education to receive scholarships to attend Oregon State college next year, plans to register in lower division here, preparatory to pursuing a course in chemistry at the school of science.

These scholarships are granted only to students from among the upper one-third of their graduating classes who face financial difficulties in attending college.

Laird was highly recommended for a scholarship by C. H. Beard, principal of Roseburg senior high school, and by others in the community.

Following his two years of lower division work, Laird will enter the school of science for his major work in chemistry. He will also have opportunity for work in the other departments of the science school, such as mathematics, bacteriology, botany, entomology, geology, physics and zoology.

In addition to maintaining a high scholastic average throughout his high school career, Laird has also taken an important part in extracurricular activities of the school. Some of these have included orchestra, band, Faraday club, drama, camera club, and the high school honor society.

An additional 21 scholarships to Oregon State college will be awarded later by the state board of higher education to students selected from among those already registered at the college who are in need of financial assistance to make it possible for them to continue. Applications for these are to be on file by June 15. It has been announced.

ANTI-BORAH TALK HALTED BY TOOZE

PORTLAND, May 25.—(AP)—Signs of differences within the Oregon republican delegation to the national party convention if a switch is agreed upon from Sen-

tor Borah as a presidential candidate appeared at an organizational meeting here.

Asked who would be their choice if the delegation found that the senator could not be nominated, one said "Landon," and another mentioned "Steiner," but Chairman Walter L. Tooez shut off further comment with the remark:

"That's no way to do. We're for Borah. The people of Oregon voted for him. This is no time to be talking about what we'll do if Borah gets out of the running."

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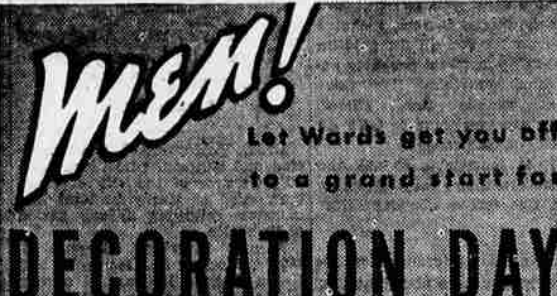


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
