total \$2,045,000 of regular federal aid, \$400,000 for secondary highways, \$585,000 for grade separation, \$175,000 for federal land highways, and \$1,980,000 for forest highways.

All federal funds except the grade separation and forest highways monies must be matched by state funds, requiring at least \$2,500,000.

Of the 1937 allocation, in which the highway improvements in and south of Roseburg are included, the Pacific highway will receive \$1,155,051. The Oregon Trail will be allocated \$558,000; the Willamette highway \$100,000; the Dallas-California highway \$263,254; and the Columbia river highway \$95,000.

POST PLANS AID IN VETS' BOND CASHING

Identification Service to Be Offered Postmaster Wimberly Here.

Umpqua post of the American Legion will offer assistance to Postmaster L. J. Wimberly of Roseburg in handling bonus bonds offered at the post office for payment. If plans discussed at the veterans here today are carried out, the post office will be able to cash the bonds.

The postmaster must personally know the veteran, or two witnesses will be required for identification. Each bond must carry the fingerprints of the applicant for cash.

It is suggested that the local post maintain a desk to aid in fingerprinting applicants for cash on their bonus bonds, and also to aid in providing identification of applicants. The post plans to volunteer such services.

BIDDEN TO CONFERENCES

The post is urged to send a large delegation to the regional rehabilitation conference to be held in Portland July 11, 12 and 13. This conference is to be attended by representatives from posts throughout the entire western area and will be addressed by Watson B. Miller, national rehabilitation chairman for the American Legion, together with national officers of the veterans administration and other prominent officials. The local post plans to send the service officer and adjutant and possibly other members to the meeting.

The local conference also gave consideration to junior baseball, the issue of compulsory military training, which is to come before the voters of the state in November; plans for the state convention in Roseburg in August, and other matters of special interest to American Legion posts.

Legion 'Boys' Too Big For Baseball Uniforms

Top Intended for Youngsters No Good for "Striplings" Of He-Man Physique.

The coach of the Legion junior baseball team are frankly worried. They have on their hands the problem of raising a hundred or so dollars to buy new uniforms. Roseburg bought the team a fine set of uniforms two years ago, and the garments, for the most part, are still in good condition, having been well cared for. The trouble is that while the team has a full set of uniforms, all usable, the boys are too big for them.

This year's team is going to be composed of real huskies. Some of the boys, despite the fact they are not yet 17 years of age, will tip the scales at almost 200 pounds and one will go over that mark. Nearly all will be from 175 pounds on up.

When the uniforms were purchased they were for much smaller boys, and this year's crop finds it mighty hard to make the buttons and buttonholes meet.

LEO LOMSKI WINS OVER EDDIE BOYLE

CHICAGO, May 26.—(AP)—Leo Lomski, one-time leading contender for the light heavyweight championship, staged a fast finish last night in his comeback attempt, to outpoint Eddie Boyle, Cleveland, eight rounds.

Lomski, weighing 184, dropped his opponent, who weighed 175, in the eighth round, and won an eight count in the eighth round to win the decision, after trailing on points during the early rounds.

Townsend plan for a transaction tax to raise funds for a \$200 monthly pension to the aged.

McGroarty conceded that a Townsend "congressional action committee" in Washington in the spring of 1935 to push passage of the McGroarty bill, had the impression Dr. Townsend was seeking to prevent passage of the measure.

Bel insisted this attitude was taken to "keep revenue coming in."

McGroarty said he "wouldn't say that," although the Townsend committee had been disappointed. He added "in defense of Robert E. Clements (former national secretary of the Townsend organization) that he worked very hard with congressmen and others to obtain passage of the bill."

Bel said Dr. Townsend "got rid" of the "congressional action committee" because they were "too enthusiastic in their efforts for the legislation."

McGroarty conceded the group "broke" with Dr. Townsend, but declined to say that Dr. Townsend abandoned his bill, which is what that means.

The California representative agreed his bill did not provide a minimum flat \$200-a-month pension as alleged by the Townsend organization. He testified it provided for a pension of "not to exceed \$200 a month."

McGroarty said he did not "stand as much in awe of professional economists and college professors as some people, and still have as much faith in the bill as I ever did."

He estimated a one per cent transaction tax would raise sufficient funds to pay monthly pension of between \$50 and \$60.

McGroarty said, however, "under full prosperity" he believed a two per cent tax would raise enough for the \$500 pensions.

The witness said he did not agree with Dr. Townsend's desire to amend the McGroarty bill in order to allow all persons over 60 to receive the pension, regardless of their wealth or economic situation.

He continued:

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McCrea quoted his informant as saying:

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"We're absolutely not trying to take over the government," Effinger said. Effinger in statements by investigators here had been called "western commander" by the Black Legion, in charge of Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

A resolution adopted by the Detroit Methodist Preachers' association yesterday called upon the authorities to "use every legal means to suppress and extirpate" the Black Legion, which it called a "monstrous perfidy."

The raids in the Detroit downtown district were conducted by Harry Colburn on information supplied by a member of the secret society.

Bombing is Charged

The informant whose name was withheld, charged the hooded band was responsible for the bombing of the home of William W. Voisine, Ecorse village president.

Prosecutor McCrea said that the informant related that "police officials and politicians" attended a meeting at which the bombing of Voisine's house was discussed.

Voisine himself charged that members of a secret night riding organization was responsible for the bombing. "There was a big gang of those fellows out here," he said.

McCrea quoted his informant as saying:

"When Voisine's name was brought up at the meeting there were shouts of 'let's take him for a ride' and 'beat him up,' but a man was appointed to do the bombing and it took place two weeks later."

Accused Men Mute

Examination on murder and kidnapping charges of 12 men named in warrants for the slaying of Charles A. Poole whose body, pierced with five bullets was found ten days ago in the ditch of a township road, has been set for tomorrow morning. The men, four of whom Prosecutor McCrea has said confessed the killing, stood mute at their arraignment Monday and

those of two former Ecorse councilmen, the raiders seized firearms and literature of the organization.

Coincidentally with the raids, came a statement from V. F. Effinger of Lima, Ohio, who had been sought for questioning by Prosecutor Duncan C. McCrea that the Black Legion had more than 6,000,000 members throughout the United States and that it had no intention of trying to take over the government.

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
