The national president of Veterans of Foreign Wars auxiliary, Mrs. Winifred Toussaint, will be an interesting guest in Roseburg Friday and Saturday, May 29-30, when she makes her official visit to the Patrick W. Kelley auxiliary.

On Friday Mrs. Toussaint will visit the veterans facility and at six-thirty o'clock that evening she will be guest of honor at a large banquet at the Grand hotel. Mrs. Toussaint will be an interesting guest speaker over KRNR Saturday morning and will also be the speaker at the Decoration day exercises at Hunt's Indian theater. Saturday afternoon the Patrick W. Kelley auxiliary members plan a delightful motor trip up the North Umpqua in honor of Mrs. Toussaint. A picnic supper will be held in the evening.

Re-elected national president of the ladies' auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States at New Orleans in September, 1935, Mrs. Winifred D. Toussaint has a record of sixteen years' active service as a local, state and national officer. Her affiliation with the auxiliary began in the spring of 1919 when she joined General Joseph Wheeler auxiliary No. 62, at that time the only V. F. W. auxiliary unit in Jersey City.

Corporal Fred C. Hall auxiliary No. 1395, originally identified as No. 242, was named in memory of her brother who was killed in action on November 4, 1918, while serving in Company L, 23rd U. S. Infantry. The auxiliary was instituted December 8, 1919, and Mrs. Toussaint transferred to the charter of this unit and became its first president. She also served as chaplain of her auxiliary in 1921-1922 and served continuously as auxiliary treasurer from 1922 to 1934.

In 1925, at the institution of the department of New Jersey, Mrs. Toussaint was elected council member for a four-year period. At the expiration of her term she was elected department president for 1929-1930.

Mrs. Toussaint's record of service in the national organization includes the offices of assistant na-

tional deputy, 1920, 1921, 1922; chairman of the 1920 ritual committee which drew up the ritual adopted by the national encampment at Detroit, Mich., in 1921; national council member from district No. 2, 1930-1932, and national junior vice president, 1932-1933. At the Milwaukee encampment in 1933 she was advanced to the office of national senior vice president and was unanimously elected to the highest ranking office in the national auxiliary at the Louisville convention of September 30-October 5, 1934.

Born in New York City, Mrs. Toussaint is the descendant of a line of patriots who served in America's wars. Her great grandfather of Frederic, Lehard Farrington of Lebanon Valley, N. Y., who fought in the War of Revolution. Her father was Frederic Lehard Hall, who served with Company G, 2nd Illinois light artillery in the Civil war, and her uncle, John Joseph Campbell, served in the United States army during the war with Spain.

In recognition of her services in the selling of Liberty bonds and thrift stamps during the World war, Mrs. Toussaint was presented a medal by the United States government. She is a member of many civic and patriotic societies, among which are the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic and Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, of which latter organization she is a charter member.
