## 40 & 8 TO GATHER AT OREGON CAVES

Members of the "40 & 8" Society of California and Oregon will gather at the Oregon caves Saturday, June 6, to participate in a big annual interstate "wreck." This is the first event of its kind ever attempted by California and Oregon voyagers. Many prominent legionnaires will be present including 40 & 8 state officials and members from as far south as Los Angeles, and much favorable publicity for southern Oregon has already appeared in print.

The beautiful new chateau at the Oregon caves has been reserved for the voyagers and the social features, which will include the official banquet, entertainment, program and dance. The "wreck" will take place in the famous "ghost chamber" of the Oregon caves, 3200 feet underground, and an impressive ceremony is planned. It is safe to say that no more fitting background for a ceremonial of this nature could be found in this or any other state in the union.

Several "goofs" (candidates) from various American Legion posts in southern Oregon will be introduced to the many mysteries and foreign customs of "La Societe" during the "wreck," which is scheduled to start at 6 p. m.

The banquet will be served at 9 p. m. and will feature short talks by Grand Chief de Gare Luban A. Steeves of the Oregon 40 & 8; Grand Chief de Gare Tom Estabrook of the California 40 & 8; and other prominent officials of this unique veterans' organization.

Grand Chief de Gare Lee Garlock urges all voyagers to send in their reservations to Niel Allen, Grants Pass, at once, for although the entire chateau has been reserved for the 40 & 8's members and their wives, present indications point to a capacity crowd. Reservations have already been received from Los Angeles, San Francisco, Fresno, Portland, Salem, Roseburg and Grants Pass.

grated in conformity with the numerical grades. Berries are usually graded by the pickers in the field, but if the amount of off grade berries exceeds the tolerance allowed in the grade they would under the old regulations have to be labeled culls even though 80 per cent or more would meet the requirements of the higher grades. On account of the nature of this class of fruit it is impractical to regrade it as it will not stand up under repeated handling; therefore, it was felt by the growers that the unclassified grades should be allowed rather than that they be forced to label such a pack culls.

Provision has been made for the use of special containers upon request and submission of sample containers for approval by the department of agriculture. This approval will be given only if the department is convinced that the new package is not deceptive, will carry or display the fruit to better advantage, or will meet with the favor of the buying public. The permission to use such special packages applies to only one season's experimental use, following which if it is found desirable they can be standardized by the regular procedure.

The state department of agriculture has announced revised grades and standards for dewberries. These revisions were made as a result of notices given and hearings held in the various producing centers of the state, largely attended by growers and dealers, and they follow closely the recommendations made at these meetings.

The only change in grades for berries is the addition of an unclassified designation for fruit not
