

PRISON TERM GIVEN TO EX-ROSEBURGER

Orval E. Langenberg, former resident of Roseburg, was sentenced to serve 18 months on sentence from Multnomah county for obtaining money by false pretense, according to word received this morning by Sheriff Percy Webb.

Langenberg, who had his home at Roseburg for many years, was fined \$300 in the justice court here in 1926 for violation of the liquor laws, and paid a \$25 fine the following year for petty larceny. Later in 1927 he was sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary for larceny following conviction in Douglas county.

Since leaving Roseburg, according to a report from the state bureau of criminal identification to Sheriff Webb, he was held for investigation at Twin Falls, Idaho, was picked up on a burglary charge in Reno county, Kansas, in a case still pending, and was also arrested in Multnomah county on a charge of threatening to commit a felony, but without action being taken on the charge.

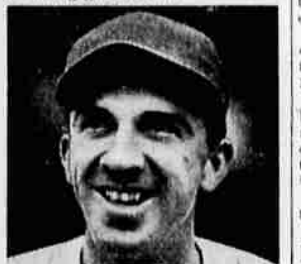

Indications that Mrs. Grace Lupp, wife of Arthur F. Hoffman said he had information that the auxiliary had been disbanded recently.

Congressmen Aroused
Michigan's democratic delegation in congress joined in the demand, initiated yesterday by Rep. Dickstein of New York for an investigation that would "blow the lid off the Black Legion."

The Michigan congressmen, headed by Rep. Sadowski, of Detroit, formed the legion a "crime fostering" organization, and asserted that if no federal law has been violated "we shall make every effort to pass one that will cover it."

These developments came as officials in Sayersville, Ky., blamed floggings of men and women there on a secret society known as the "Black Legion," which they said was organized in the same manner as the Black Legion.

Prosecutor McGee of Detroit awaited a reply from Attorney General Homer S. Cummings to his appeal for department of justice aid in investigating the organization, which he said apparently was organized in at least 15 states.

City Workers Suspended
Police Commissioner Heinrich Pickert opened an investigation today to determine whether the black-cloaked band had included a reported "60 or 70" police officers on its secret roster.

Eight members of the street railways department already are under suspension on suspicion of membership in the legion, and city authorities are under orders to discharge any employees shown to be connected with the night riding organization.

Local authorities proceeded with preparations for calling a statewide grand jury to investigate the mounting list of terroristic acts attributed to the blood-banded brotherhood.

Mrs. Lupp, found at her summer cottage near Algonac, Mich., admitted she was a "colonel" in the Black Legion auxiliary.

"We met around at each other's homes," she said. "There was a ritual, and we wore robes, but I cannot tell you very much about that. It was a milder ritual than the men's, though."

Mrs. Lupp said the auxiliary was formed in 1934.

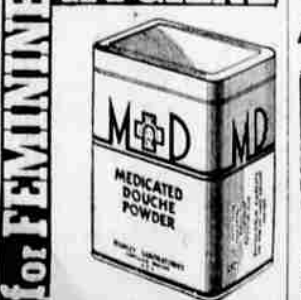
DOG SCREEN STAR TO PERFORM HERE

NATION-WIDE DRIVE IS SOCIALIST PLAN

CLEVELAND, May 27.—(AP)—The socialist party set forth today on its most extensive campaign since Eugene Victor Debs toured the nation in the famous "red special."

Instead of the special train, the party now has a fleet of red sound trucks, which will be sent throughout the country during the campaign, operating out of the central party headquarters in Chicago.

Norman Thomas, again the presidential nominee, leaves Cleveland late today for a series of speaking engagements en route back to his New York home. Within a few weeks, he will make the first of a series of trips around the nation, taking off a month in mid-summer and ending with a transcontinental "lower berth" campaign beginning in early September.

The vice-presidential nominee, George Nelson—a "dirt farmer" from Polk county, Wisconsin, prominent in the Farmers' Union and cooperative movement—will confine his speaking trips to the agricultural areas of the middle west.

Aim at Constitution
One of the principal points the socialists will emphasize in the campaign will be the issue of constitutional change. They prepared the way for this in their platform, adopted at the closing session of the convention yesterday, which advocated immediate passage of the workers' and farmers' rights amendment to give the federal government authority to acquire and operate basic industries and to end the "usurped power of the supreme court to declare social legislation unconstitutional."

Declaring the "new deal, like the old deal, has failed," the platform advocated several other "immediate demands" in addition to constitutional change, including:

An appropriation of six billion dollars to continue federal relief to the unemployed for the next year; a drastic increase in income and inheritance taxes on the high-income levels and of excess profits taxes; the 24-hour week and the abolition of injunctions in labor disputes and the prohibition of company unions.

Socialized Medicine Urged
The platform also contained a plank of socialized medicine, saying: "We propose adequate medical care of the sick and injured as a social function, right and duty, and not as private or public charity. This to be financed by taxation similar to the public educational system or government functions, and to be democratically administered."

The convention authorized the national committee to call a mass congress "genuinely representative of trade unions, working farmers and unemployed for the for-



mulation of a program of action to protect civil liberties, to obtain real social security, and to secure enactment of the workers' and farmers' rights amendment."

The convention adopted a resolution assailing William Randolph Hearst and condemning the "vicious un-American, anti-liberalism and incipient fascism which he represents." It urged a boycott of all Hearst publications.

RED CROSS CHAPTER ORGANIZED HERE

Organization of the Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross was perfected at a meeting of the newly elected board of directors at the Episcopal parish house last night.

Mrs. Arthur Clark was chosen chairman, Mrs. Perry Smith, vice-chairman; Mrs. George H. Smith, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. V. R. Buckenham, home production chairman; Mrs. Stella Quinn, Junior Red Cross chairman; Dr. H. C. Chace, physician chairman; Dr. J. B. Foley, disaster chairman; and Mrs. E. A. Post, home service secretary.

The board of directors includes Mayor Charles W. Clark, Ralph R. Leonard, Ernest Fugate, Dr. C. G. Van Velsah, W. M. Campbell and Mrs. Thomas Parkinson.

Chairmen of other committees and departments, together with board members from outlying districts, as well as members of various committees, will be named at the next regular meeting.

Auxiliary Discussed
Organization of the Civil Liberties Service, an auxiliary to the Red Cross, was discussed by Mrs. Mabel E. Axline, from national headquarters, who is here for several days to aid in perfecting the organization.

The group will be made up of volunteer workers, who will cooperate with the recreational department of the veterans administration. Members will give time to read, entertain, and otherwise aid in recreation and service to members of the veterans facility. Such organizations, Mrs. Axline stated, are maintained in nearly all cities where veterans facilities are located.

Miss Helen Casey has accepted the temporary chairmanship for this work and several well qualified ladies have already enrolled. Meetings are being arranged to complete their instructions while Mrs. Axline is in Roseburg.

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

MILTON, Ore., May 28.—(AP)—The Umatilla county court selected C. D. Hobbs, city councilman here, to fill the unexpired term of the late James H. E. Scott as state representative from the twenty-third district.

Hobbs will serve only until the November general election, and will see no active legislative duty this term unless another special session of the legislature is called.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28.—(AP)—Charles Hoskins, special officer in the Indian service, arrested Ollis W. Brink, 34, on charges of selling a bottle of wine to an Indian within the walls of the federal building here.

The Indian, Meda Baker, from Klamath Falls, was here as a government witness before the grand jury.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28.—(AP)—Business will continue to improve for at least a year, Alfred P. Sloan Jr., president of the Gen-

eral Motors corporation, predicted today.

"After that it depends a great deal on how intelligently we manage our affairs," he added.

He said if the credit trend continued throughout the year, the automobile business "will be back to 80 per cent of 1929."

PORTLAND, May 27.—(AP)—An urgent call for strawberry pickers went out today. A. G. Johnson, district manager of the federal re-employment service, said the berries in the Banks and Cornelius areas must be harvested immediately if growers are to escape losses.

FOREST GROVE, May 28.—(AP)—Operation of a municipal light plant here brought more than \$45,000 in cash into the general fund in the past five years, a report today showed. The figure did not include credit for street lighting amounting to \$21,433.

PORTLAND, May 27.—(AP)—Major-General Johnson Hagood, famous army figure, said today the country could have a "better system of national defense at a great deal less cost to the taxpayers" if the "bunk was cut out of the matter of supply, organization and training."

The general, visiting here on a business trip, said he was writing a book which would point out the way to eliminate waste and would make a recruit an expert rifleman in five hours.

WOOL THIEF GETS SIX-YEAR TERM

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Hidebrandt, Hallmark said, drove to Portland, where he sold the wool, and purchased a light truck with which he proposed to transport more wool. He secured the services of a hitch-hiker to drive the truck, the court was told.

Hidebrandt stood silent during the passing of sentence, except to nod assent when questioned whether or not he understood the court's statements of the district attorney concerning his activities and past records were correct.

"It is apparent to the court that you came to this county for the purpose of stealing wool from farmers," Judge Winberry said.

"Undoubtedly the person to whom you sold the wool knew that the produce was stolen and should be prosecuted."

"The legislature in its wisdom recognized various degrees of culpability in matters of theft by fixing a wide range of punishment. Motives for thievery vary. A man may be hungry and may steal to appease his hunger. A child or a weak character may steal because an article is attractive."

No Excuse Seen
"A crime of the type of which you are accused, however, offers no excuse."

"Farm products, because of the fact that they are scattered and are for the most part in sparsely settled districts, are comparatively unprotected from marauders. It is the kind of property for which police forces can give the least protection."

"It therefore devolves upon the courts to make an example of those who are apprehended in the theft of farm products, and for that reason the court can show no leniency in this case."
