

GIANTS TIE CARDS FOR TOP POSITION

Hubbell Smashes Brooklyn
Jinx With 5-4 Victory
in 12 Innings.

There seems no keeping those New York Giants out of the national league lead for any length of time, despite their string of tough luck and the expert predictions that they're due to crack wide open any day.

Just a week after they last saw first place, they were back on top again today, deadlocked with the gas house team from St. Louis, and boasting a winning streak that reached five straight yesterday with Hubbell's mastery of his troublesome Brooklyn Dodgers jinx.

Just to give the whole major league situation a more distinctly metropolitan air, the New York Yankees—another outfit for which the experts have given little hope in the present chase—were sporting a game-and-a-half lead in the American loon, with two-thirds of their "crucial" series with the Boston Red Sox behind them.

The Giants' advance to a first place tie, by a 5-4 12-inning victory over the Dodgers, headed a general re-shuffling of the National League back in yesterday's program. Pittsburgh and Cincinnati moved up to third and fourth, with wins over the Cardinals 11-2 and Chicago Cubs, 5-3, respectively, sending the Cubs back to fifth. The Dodgers sank into the cellar again through defeat by the Giants, and the Phillies climbed to seventh place with a 5-2 conquest of the Boston Bees.

In the American league, the Yanks outdistanced the Sox 5-3 in an 11-inning dine-dine affair, which saw Manager Cronin return to the

CARNERA DEFEATED AGAIN BY HAYNES

NEW YORK, May 28.—(AP)—Another of the bad breaks which have studied his fistic fortunes put old Primo Carnera, the lumbering Italian heavyweight, back among the fistic second raters today.

He lost his ten round return battle with Leroy Haynes, the new Philadelphia sensation, at Ebbets field last night when an attack of paralysis in his left leg forced him to quit after 40 seconds of the ninth round.

Haynes was ahead on points at the time and probably would have been returned a winner, but "Da Preem," by holding the colored boy on even terms throughout most of the fight, partly atoned for the three-round knockout Haynes scored in Philadelphia two months ago.

Disappointed and discouraged, Carnera would not discuss his ring future as his handlers worked on his leg in the dressing room after the fight. He is to leave soon for an exhibition tour of Europe, but after that he isn't sure. His friends say he may never return to America to fight.

Haynes flashed a good right hand, but his showing as a whole was disappointing to the fans who had expected a more sensational performance in view of his speedy knockout victory in Philadelphia. The negro is fast, shifty, boxes well and is learning to use his left. His right carries plenty of authority, but it was ineffective last night in the rounds in which Carnera elected to box. Carnera weighed 265 pounds, Haynes 200.

Andy Niederreiter, Ebbets field promoter, said today he hopes to match Haynes with Jack Sharkey of Boston, former heavyweight champion, now trying a comeback, in a June bout.

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—(AP)—Vincent Lopez won in straight falls last night from Joe Savoldi in a wrestling match billed as involving Lopez' title as world's heavyweight champion.

Savoldi lost the first fall in 30 minutes when he missed a flying dropkick to the chin and landed on his head, stunning himself. Lopez flipped him over and pinned him to the mat.

At the start of the second round, Savoldi remained seated in his corner and then as Lopez charged across the mat, he suddenly sprang up and launched another dropkick. He missed again and again landed on his head. Lopez pinned him in 20 minutes to win the match. Savoldi weighed 220 and Lopez 215 pounds.
