

YANKS UPSET IDEA OF BEING 'THROUGH'

For a club that's supposed to be limping with injuries, packed with doddering old men and due to blow sky-high before long, the revival of the "murderers' row" somehow doesn't fit into the rest of the New York Yankees picture this season.

The power they've shown since the start of the campaign which has them riding two-and-a-half games in front of the American league pack as a result of their just-concluded "crucial" series with the Boston Red Sox, has the experts guessing—and wondering how long it can last.

The series with the Sox, which they took two games to one by capturing yesterday's three-game finale, not only marked a continuation of the return of the batting heyday of Ruth and company, but uncovered definite traces of brass on the gold-plated Boston roster—particularly around the pitching department. For, of seven pitchers tossed in against the Yankees bats, only Mes Ferrell in the opening game was able to check the bombardment.

Glants Slip Back.
While the Yankees were stretching their American league lead, their New York neighbors, the Glants, lost their one-day option on the National league first place by bowing out to the Boston Bees in a double-header, 4-3 and 5-4. The Cardinals, although losing out 7-2 to Weaver's tight pitching for the third-place Pittsburgh Pirates, retained the lead exclusively.

Behind the leaders, the Cubs held fourth place by an 11-5 win over the Cincinnati Reds in a battle featured by two first-throwing episodes at home plate, while the Dodgers climbed out of the league cellar with a slugging 13-10 conquest in the Phillies ball park.

In the American league, meantime, the world's champion Detroit Tigers sank into fourth place when the Chicago White Sox bunched four hits in the ninth for a 6-5 triumph; Cleveland took third with a 6-5 win over the St. Louis Browns, chiefly on Hale's homer with the bases loaded, and the Athletics gained an even break with the Senators by taking the opener of a doubleheader 4-3 before dropping the nightcap 5-0.

MISSIONS CLIMB BACK TO SECOND

Errors, extra innings and the peculiarities of the percentage book kept the restless clubs on the move in the Pacific Coast league.

In four hours and 43 minutes of baseball, the Missions conquered the Angels 12-5, 4-3 to move back into second place, one point above Seattle, which snatched Oakland down 13-3 for the league leaders seventh consecutive defeat.

The Seals and Padres changed places again in the middle of the standings when San Francisco won a new teninning battle with San Diego 4-3.

Dixie Howell, who starred on the football field for Alabama, starred for the wrying team last night as he helped Sacramento to a 5-4 win over Portland. His two errors were responsible for two Senator runs as the Beavers, for whom Dixie covers left field, went down for their sixth successive defeat. They are now only half a game ahead of the seventh place Sacramento club.

The second game at San Francisco went 13 innings before the Missions won, with the aid of loose Angel fielding.

DONKEY BASEBALL DATED IN ROSEBURG

Donkey baseball is returning to Roseburg for games Sunday and Monday, June 7 and 8, under the sponsorship of the Roseburg Lions club. Proceeds from the entertainment Sunday afternoon and Monday evening will be used by the club to furnish glasses for needy children.

Players mounted on trained donkeys will play a regular game of softball. The Tired Business Men will meet a 29-30 club team in the Sunday game, while the Lions club will play the Fire Department Monday night.

In addition to the baseball games, there will be a short session of donkey polo, in which players, mounted on donkeys will use brooms for mallets and a rubber ball for a chukker.

There will also be a comedy exhibition by a trained mule.

FOUR FINED FOR BALL GAME SCRAP

NEW YORK, May 29.—(AP)—Ford Frick, president of the National league, today fined Capt. Waddy English of the Chicago Cubs and Pitcher Les Stine of the Cincinnati Reds \$25 each and George Kelly and Roy Johnson, coaches of the Reds and Cubs respectively, \$50 each for their fight in yesterday's game at Chicago.

After talking to Bill Stewart, who was the umpire behind the plate during the fight, Frick sent a warning to the coaches that "they have no business getting into fights between the players."

Frick decided that it was the coaches' action that made "a trivial incident into a serious matter."

COMPROMISE TAX BILL GIVEN O. K.

\$12,000, 17 per cent on the next \$25,000, and 18 per cent on all over \$40,000.

Accompanying that alteration was an agreement to remove a \$1,000 tax exemption which would have been granted corporations with net income not exceeding \$15,000. King said the result, so far as revenue was concerned, would be unchanged.

Higher Levies Rejected

The committee rejected by a 13 to 5 vote a final attempt by administration forces to swing the committee over to higher graduated levies on undistributed corporate earnings. Senator Black (D., Ala.), proposed a system for retaining the present 12 1/2 to 15 per cent corporate levy, with a surtax graduating up to 30 per cent on undistributed earnings.

The bill as approved also would subject corporate dividends to the 4 per cent normal income tax. King said he believed the bill would "bring in more than \$600,000,000 of permanent and temporary funds."

The bill was not expected to reach the floor before next week. Individual income surtaxes would be boosted under today's decision by one per cent in each bracket between \$6,000 and \$50,000. The lowest bracket—\$4,000 to \$6,000—would not be subjected to the one per cent increase. All taxpayers paying surtaxes on \$50,000 or more would pay \$400 more tax, although they would not have the 1 per cent increase.

Changes Made

The committee made these additional changes:
To meet arguments that present law curtails prospecting for oil, the tax on an individual who sells oil and gas wells would be restricted to 30 per cent of the selling price. He now is taxed as for any other capital gain.

The section of present law providing high graduated rates on personal holding companies would be retained, but the 20 to 60 per cent levies all would be reduced by 7 per cent. That was done, committee members said, because the corporations would have to pay the 7 per cent levy on undistributed profits.

Small loan companies which make loans of less than \$300 would be exempt from personal holding company taxes.

A "cushion" would be provided for corporations with contracts not to pay dividends until they have paid off debts, by making the 7 per cent undistributed profits tax inapplicable to them.

The committee approved bill deports sharply from the form in which it passed the house and also from the original tax suggestions of the president, who was unable, despite a conference with committee members Tuesday, to swing the majority toward steeper taxes on undistributed corporate earnings.

left the administration building but when he shook hands with the officials and guards, he expressed deep emotion.

"God bless you warden, and thanks for the kind treatment," Feh said to Warden Lewis. Turning to Eugene Halley, deputy warden, he said: "You have been very kind."

Coming down the stairs Feh laughingly remarked "I got a great kick out of all this. But you boys don't know the conditions. Come up to Mrs. Feh's place at 575 Center street in Salem and I will be glad to talk to you fellows any time, but not now."

Feh's attorney was not present when he apparently changed his mind and accepted the parole. Lewis said: "He talked about the matter with me yesterday and I told him the decision was up to him." Ed Duffy, parole officer, said Feh called him in and announced he was ready to sign. He had talked with Mrs. Feh yesterday.

In addition to the \$5 presented by the state, Feh had earned some money in the machine shop and left with about \$10. He said he did not know what he would do or where he would go.

Signing the receipts necessary as he left, Feh used the name "Earl H. Feh," but in signing the parole acceptance he prefaced the name with "Judge."

Court Fight Fails.
Feh was received at the penitentiary August 15, 1933, following the political upheaval in Jackson county resulting to the theft of ballots from the courthouse at Medford. He was the last to be released of the several sent to the penitentiary for that crime.

About the time Feh was to have been automatically released after allowing good time behavior, April 15, under the procedure which had been followed for some years, the attorney general ruled the procedure was against the law and parole was necessary.

Governor Martin issued the parole upon condition the prisoner remain away from Jackson county. Feh refused to accept, and his wife started habeas corpus proceedings. Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon this week dispensed the action on the grounds the "law was plain and that a mandamus action could not control under the act."

In his acceptance, Feh stated he understood the conditions and would abide by them.
