The most serious angle to this situation, survey shows, has been that the depression has also checked the activities of Cupid and forced the modern young woman to turn to a job rather than matrimony. Interviews with a score of representative young ladies brought admissions from many that they were merely "marking time" and that circumstances had forced them to discard many of their former hopes for a career or happy early marriage.
