The press first began its work in Oregon City in 1846, where on February 6 it printed the Spectator, the first newspaper west of the Rocky Mountains. It was presented to the University school of Journalism in 1915 by Harrison and Webster Kincaid, who formerly published the Oregon State Journal on it in Eugene.
