NEUTRALITY URGED BY WOMEN'S CLUBS

THE DALES, May 30—(AP)—The Oregon Federation of Women's clubs chose Pendleton for the 1938 convention at the close of the biennial session here Friday. Award of the convention to Pendleton was a tribute to the newly-elected president, Mrs. A. C. McIntyre. The convention closed with the adoption of resolutions calling upon the United States to maintain a position of neutrality in international affairs, advocating public education to promote temperance and demanding enactment by the present congress of legislation to dispose of Bonneville dam power. The state constitution of the federation was amended, effective in 1938, to provide a three-year term of office for state officials in place of the present biennial terms. The change will make the state federation offices conform to the terms of the national offices. The amendment also makes it mandatory that a state federation official occupy her post but one term.

CHINESE STUDENTS REVILE JAPANESE

SHANGHAI, May 29.—Two thousand Shanghai students paraded the streets today, shouting epithets against Japanese and waving huge banners in an anti-Japanese demonstration similar to that held Thursday by Tientsin students. The demonstrators, under the herding of scores of police, were shunted from the business district without incident. The demonstration followed a mass meeting in observance of the 11th anniversary of the "May 30 incident." In that incident, four students were killed and many injured by international settlement police while attempting to storm the jail in which several students were held following an anti-Japanese demonstration arising from the killing of a Chinese worker.

Hoan's Victory Recalls Record



Recent re-election of Daniel Webster Hoan as mayor of Milwaukee calls attention to the stellar record of this Socialist mayor who is now beginning his sixth consecutive four-year term. Under his 20-year administration Milwaukee has enjoyed a financial status equalled by few cities in United States, has built up an efficient police and fire department, instituted many social projects of inestimable value, and developed a school and park system of high merit. Although a Socialist by affiliation, his political career having started under tutelage of the late Victor Berger, noted Socialist leader, Mayor Hoan is in no sense a radical. He is married and has two children, lives in a modest home in an unfashionable district, and tempers his Marxian ideas with the teachings of his hero, Abraham Lincoln.
